Most people who are interested in Indian affairs have some general notion of the functions of the India Council in London, and they probably have a shrewd idea that its influence on the Secretary of State's decisions depends largely on the strength of character of a chief, generally unacquainted with India personally, as compared with the qualifications of his advisers. In the absence of published reports of the debates in Council perhaps the best way of affording the value of the Council, as at present constituted, is to give a brief account of each of its members, his previous career, and characteristics. In doing this it is possible, more or less, to group the members according to the subjects on which they are specially qualified to advise.

In financial matters Lord Morley has to look to the advice of Sir Felix Schuster and Sir James Mackay. The former is too well-known as a high authority on banking and finance generally to require much description.
