STARVED TO DEATH WITH \$3,000 IN THE HOUSE

Husband on a Spree—Police Curious Regarding the Presence of So Much Money.

HOLYOKE, Mass., March 23—Dead as a result of starvation and neglect, according to the report of the medical examiner, although \$3,000 in banknotes and cash was strewn about the house, the body of Mrs. Mary Gately was found at her home on Lyman Street today. The woman's husband, Martin Gately, a paper maker, was arrested this morning on the charge of drunkenness. Mrs. Gately had been dead three days.

Medical Examiner Frank Holyoke reported today finding the body of Mrs. Gately made up as a bed. After an examination he stated his belief that Mrs. Gately had died from starvation and neglect and that she had been dead three days.

The Holyoke police tonight are investigating the presence of the bank notes and cash in the house. The sum of \$2,514 was represented in the bank books and all of it was deposited during the first four months of 1908. The house which the Gatelys occupied was also bought during the same time.

FLEET BIDS FAREWELL TO LORD CHARLES BERESFORD

Ambassador Bryce Honored—Interesting Event in Astor Family—Famous Locomotive Designer Dead.

LONDON, March 23—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, the commander of the Channel Fleet, who hauls down his flag at Portsmouth tomorrow, was given a memorable send-off when he bade farewell to the fleet at Portland this afternoon. The band on each vessel played Auld Lang Syne as the flagship passed and the cheering was kept up until the Admiral's ship had cleared the bay.

BERKELEY, Cal., March 23—The degree of doctor of laws was conferred today on British Ambassador James Bryce by the Academy Council of the University of California. This is the first time anyone has been thus honored by the university since the degree was conferred on President Roosevelt in 1903. The degree was conferred on Ambassador Bryce at the Charter Day exercises in the Greek Theatre before 5,000 persons.

LONDON, March 23—Mrs. Walford Astor, formerly Mrs. Nancy Langhorne Shaw, of Virginia, gave birth to a daughter, Monday at Cliveden.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 23—William P. Henny, a member of the firm of Burnham, Williams and Company, proprietors of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, and one of the most prominent designers of locomotives in the world, died at his home here today from pneumonia, aged 71 years.

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THE FERRY SERVICE

The ferry service was somewhat crippled last evening when the Ludlow broke her steering gear while making the 5.30 trip to the West Side. She made a couple of trips afterwards and while leaving the West Side dock with about 300 people aboard, to make the 7.30 trip, the steering gear again broke down. She managed to get about thirty feet from the docks a couple of times, but had to return again. When she docked a large number of the passengers left and took the cars for the city. About 200 who remained aboard were treated to a moonlight excursion around the harbor. After several attempts had been made to leave the West Side dock she at last backed out of the slip, turned around and reached the East Side dock at 8 o'clock.

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THE QUEEN AND A LADY SINGER.

Among the passengers who left Charing Street Station recently for Paris was a sweet-faced dark-eyed little lady, who had been in London for three days unknown to the general public, and who, within the space of fifteen hours had had the honor of singing first of all to the Prince and Princess of Wales at Viscount Iveagh's reception on Tuesday night, and to the Queen at Buckingham Palace on Wednesday afternoon. Mme. Maria Galvani is the name of this very fortunate vocalist, and it was only in consequence of an engagement today at the Paris Galette that she has been unable to prolong her stay in England.

"I have never crossed the Channel before," said Mme. Galvani, to a Standard representative, "and naturally I was a little nervous when I heard that I was engaged to sing at Lord Iveagh's house in the presence of the Prince and Princess of Wales. However, the entertainment went off all right, and some of the audience were extremely charming to me, paying me compliments which I most appreciated. When my husband and I returned to our hotel we were surprised to find that we had arranged to leave London on Wednesday morning.

"Early on Wednesday we paid our hotel bill and took our luggage to the station in a four-wheeled cab. I was in charge of the railway company, and not seeing it until we reached the station I was told by Mr. George Ashton that he had received a command from the Queen that I should sing to her at Buckingham Palace, and that I was to be ready at 2 o'clock. What was I to do? I could not appear before Her Majesty in my own dress, and I had not had time to get my trunks away from the railway company after I had registered them. Well, that lunch was never finished.

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ASTORY OF SEDITION IN INDIA.
