

VOTES FOR WOMEN

Mrs. Oliver H. P. Belmont, of New York, has just become a life member of the National American Woman

During the past year the Women's Social and Political Union, of London, has enlarged its office force from 30 to 75 persons, its headquarters from 13 rooms to 19. Its literature sales have increased from \$3,000 to \$10,000 and the circuation of its organ, "Votes for Women," from 5,000 a month to 20,060s

The headquarters of the National The headquarters of the National American Woman Suffrage Association at Warren, Ohio, reports a hitherato unprecedented demand for literature. From Nov. 1, '08, to April 1, '09, an average of upward 2,000 pieces for each working day was sent out, making a total of 261,925 pieces for that short period.

The morning after the defeat of the Liberal candidate at the recent election in Glasgow, Premier Asquith received about a thousand post cards, all reading as follows: "Sir, I have this day recorded my vote against your candidate at the request of the Women's Freedom League, as a protest against your attitude towards the
