EMPEROR OF ASIA.

STEAMER GROUND.

Seattle, July 14.—Str Jeanne grounded at 5 a. m. on Starr Rock, Bolinas, where str Santa Ana was recently damaged. The Jeanne struck at low tide and was later floated undamaged. She was to take the Santa Ana's cargo.

DIGBY SHIPPING.

The heavy blow of Friday and which lasted throughout the night sent quite a fleet into Digby for shelter, five fishermen and two coasters. The latter were the Neva, loaded with piling, from Bear River, and the Agnes G. Donahue with bricks, from Annapolis, both bound out. The schooner Rolfe, Capt. Durant, from Parrabro with coal, was out in the whole of it. She got in this morning after a rough experience but sustained no damage. The Rolfe is the vessel that took fire from a gasoline explosion at Parrabro just before it was to sail for Digby. Capt. Durant took charge, as Capt. Rowe was injured.

The steamship Indiana, at Ardrossan from Port Wade, with iron ore, crossed the Atlantic in eight days. Schooner Mary L. Crosby was towed from Yarmouth to Weymouth by the tug Freddie V. to load for an American port.

The American schooner Mary E. Pennel, loading lumber here for New York, will be ready for sea by Tuesday.

A large fleet of vessels went out of St. Mary's Bay last week with pulp, piling, cordwood and lumber. Some were bound to American ports, others to the West Indies.

WOMAN WHOSE WORK BROUGHT
RAILROAD STRIKE CONFERENCE

MRS. J. BORDEN HARTMAN

That the honor of averting the railroad strike, which threatened to tie up the commerce of the entire Eastern part of the United States, belongs to Mrs. J. Borden Hartman, niece of E. H. Hartman, late railroad king, was admitted at the White House.

Mrs. Hartman, the only woman ever appointed a member of the Industrial Commission, heard rumors of a strike before the trouble found its way into print. She went at once to the President and placed the matter before him, laying particular emphasis on the fact that the strike would tie up completely Eastern commerce and might seriously damage the record of the democratic administration.

S'PT OF IMMIGRATION
WILL NOT EXPRESS AN
OPINION ON CIRCULAR

Warning Issued by Trades and Labor Council to Intending Immigrants to be dealt with.

Ottawa, July 21.—Not a word of comment on the warning to prospective immigrants from Great Britain, just issued by the Trades and Labor Council, would be made by W. D. Scott, superintendent of immigration for the Dominion government.

It is very probable, however, that Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, and under whose jurisdiction the immigration branch co-operates, will bring the contents of the circular in question before his colleagues in the cabinet. Dr. Roche is at present out of the city, but will return tomorrow.
