INQUIRY INTO ANTHRACITE FREIGHT RATES

Discrimination Claim is Made to Inter-state Commerce Commission.

MEANS ARTIFICIAL SHORTAGE OF FUEL

Anthracite Coal Carrying Railroads Discriminate Against Independents Shipping Hard Coal to Central West.

Philadelphia, Nov. 19.—Declarations that the anthracite coal-carrying railroads discriminate against the independent shippers hard coal to the central west in favor of the so-called railroad coal companies and that this alleged discrimination leads the independents to seek more profitable markets, thus creating an artificial shortage of fuel in the fall and winter months, were made today at the Inter-State Commerce Commission inquiry into anthracite freight rates.

Mr. Eastman's testimony came after counsel for the commission had concluded examining operating officials of the Erie, Reading and Lehigh Valley railroads regarding the handling of coal.

Mr. Eastman testified that the freight rate on anthracite from the mines to Buffalo at the Inter-State Commerce Commission is \$1.75. He further testified that on account of the differential in freight rates on coal going in the same direction, with the same tonnage, to the east, west and Michigan coal dealers' associations, representing 2,000 dealers, were in Philadelphia ready to protest before the commission against the coal freight rate to their states.

As a shipper in Chicago, Mr. Eastman said, "as long as we purchased anthracite coal from what is known as the railway coal companies, 25 cents a ton was handed back to us when the coal was consigned to points that take the \$2 rate."

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WENT HOME AND FOUND WIFE GONE

Edward King of 51 Brooks Street, North End, was Treated to Rude Surprise Last Evening.

A case of desertion in which the woman instead of the man has taken the initiative, came to light yesterday afternoon in the North End, when Edward King of 51 Brooks street, returned home to find his wife and small family missing and nothing left for him but to test his culinary ability and look after matters at home.

Indeed even in performing these necessary duties the confused man found himself considerably hampered for the housewife whose departure, it is said, was unexplained, not only removed herself and her two small children but also took clothes, bed quilts, cooking utensils, and in fact anything easily removable.

According to the young husband who has been bereft of wife and family, no quarrel arose which prompted the woman's departure and the perturbed man is placed in a rather sad position.

King had been driving a team all day and returned at dark with the expectation of meeting his wife and family. Instead he found no one to greet him and some of the household articles removed and the rooms showing evidence of having been thoroughly ransacked.

Mrs. King was a native of Parrboro, and her two children which she took with her were respectively two and four years old.

It is understood she had been keeping company with another North End man and has continued to do so despite the warnings of her husband.

To cap King's trouble he is obliged to appear in court this morning for violating the traffic law.

Seattle, Nov. 19.—That the time is not ripe for the formation of a labor party but that trade unionists should look forward to increasing political activity, was affirmed today as the position of the American Federation of Labor, which adopted by a vote of 193 to 15 a declaration of principles.

The principal speakers on the declaration were N. Hayes, Socialist floor leader, and Jas. Duncan, first vice-president favoring it, and George L. Berry, president of the International Printing Pressmen's Union, opposed. Hayes said the Socialist party would enter into no alliances that would require modification of the Socialist platform.

Two resolutions brought up the religious question, as influencing the formation of Christian trade unions in Europe, were speedily defeated, the resolutions committee declaring: "Nothing could be more injurious to the labor movement than the injection of sectarian religious matters."

THE MANCHESTER BOAT ON DOCK

The Donaldson Liner Saturnia will take the place of the Saturnia in the sailing from Glasgow to St. John on December 29th instead of the 31st.

MANCHESTER BOAT ON DOCK. The S. S. Manchester Commerce entered the dry dock at St. John's, N.B., on the 15th. The repairs will take considerable time, as some special plates have to be imported.

ALLAN LINE MOVEMENTS. S. S. Corcan was 465 miles east of Cape Race November 19th. She is due at Quebec Saturday forenoon, and Montreal Sunday morning.

S. S. Tunisian was 490 miles west of Malin Head at midnight on Monday and is due at Liverpool this morning.

THE J. L. COLWELL DAMAGED. Schooner J. L. Colwell has been towed into Rockland, Me., full of water and with her bottom badly damaged. The schooner, while bound from St. John, N. B., for Boston via lumber, struck on Otter Island, Muschel Ridge Channel. A wire from Mr. J. W. Smith at Rockland, says that the deckload of the schooner J. L. Colwell would be removed and the vessel examined to determine the extent of the damage.

SCHOONER FLOATED. The schooner Monte Memmie which was recently reported as sunk Harbor Bouche, N. B., has been floated, according to reports received. The vessel will be towed to Port Hawkesbury and hauled up on the slip, where the small leak which caused the trouble will be attended to, and the schooner will be as good as new. Her cargo of oil will be sold at auction probably today.

TO HELP IN WAR TIME. Delegates from 25 yacht clubs and two associations of yacht and power boat clubs, representing in all about 100 clubs along the Great Lakes and the Atlantic coast, were in session last week at the New York Yacht Club.

The meeting was held at the request of the Navy Department, the object being to promote a better acquaintance among the owners of power boats and to establish a high standard of skill in the handling of such boats. The meeting was called by the officers of the power boat squadron of the Boston Yacht Club and was presided over by Commodore of that club, president of the meeting.

The object desired by the Navy Department is that in time of war the trained amateur of the Great Lakes and the Atlantic coast, who has been in the habit of cruising in his own harbor or along the coast, the Malaya yacht clubs were represented, by Commander Holman P. Day of Portland Yacht Club power squadron who was in New York last week, planning to represent the local yachtmen.—(Portland Argus).
