SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole basis of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within miles of the land, on certain conditions. A habitable house required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$4.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years. Must reside six months in each of three years. Cultivate to acre and erect a house worth \$200.

Deputy of the Minister of Interior, N. B.—Quota will not be paid for homesteaders.
