I think Canada is the richer and better for having a province of Quebec and the French Canadian race, and I hope you will always maintain your splendid traditions, your language and your religion."
"I hope in the near future that we will be a more united people than we are today, that this grand old province will be fully represented in the government and that we will hear less and less as time goes on, about creed and race; that we will all be bigger and greater Canadians than in the past."

Memorial Brass Tablet Unveiled

Roll at St. John's (Stone)
Church Contains Names of
116 Members.

At the eleven o'clock service yesterday morning in St. John's (Stone) church, a memorial brass tablet was unveiled in memory of those who had served in the Great War, 1914-1918.
The service, opened by D. Arnold, Fox, the organist, playing "Who is on the Lord's Side," which was followed by the 147th Psalm, "Deliverance," 190th Psalm "O Praise God in His Holiness," Lesson 24th, Joshua, and 1st Thessalonians—4th Chapter, and the hymn "Praise My Soul the King of Heaven."

After the morning prayer had ended, Bishop Richardson, preceded by the rector, Osgood Kurling and two wardens, J. B. Secord and Geo. L. Warwick, proceeded to the tablet in the north wall at the front east of the chancel, where, after stating: "This tablet which we are about to unveil contains the names of 116 members of St. John's (Stone) church who went forth in the great cause. His Lordship called upon the wardens to unveil the tablet."

Blessed the Tablet
Bishop Richardson thereupon blessed the tablet saying "Who bless Thy Holy Name for these Thy servants who gave their lives for a great cause," and dedicated the tablet "To the Glory of God and in honor of those of St. John's (Stone) church who served in the Great War." His Lordship also read a portion of the seventh book of the Revelation, Chapter 21, verses 1 to 6, and the 1st of Peter, which were followed by the large congregation. During the whole service of the unveiling and dedication of the tablet, every member of the congregation stood and the conclusion was followed by several moments of silence in reverence to God and remembrance of the dead.

His Memory is Blessed
The Bishop had as his text "His memory is blessed forever," 1st. Macabees, 3rd Chapter, 7th Verse, and in the course of his eloquent sermon referred to the eager response of the manhood of Canada to the call of duty and in mentioning the departure of the first contingent from Valcartier and subsequent ones likened them to an army of brave and noble hearts, quoting "Little Mother We Come." Many had trained on the muddy plains of Salisbury before going to Flanders, but notwithstanding the treacherous gas fumes and the other numerous horrors of war, their ideal and purpose were not weakened, and they continued their desperate fight and planted the cross on Vimy Ridge. In pointing out the spirit of the men, His Lordship quoted the reply to Colonel John Macrae's memorial poem "In Flanders Field," entitled "Victory," which had the men succeeded? The speaker asked. They succeeded because they had a vision, heard a call and responded casting in all they had. It was not only a great adventure going forth with a noble aim, not only the call of the blood, the favour of patriotism, call of humanity or the high ideals of civilization, but the great miracle of success and comfort poured out from those in the homeland.

Vimy Memorial Church
While the offering was being taken Dwight Cairns sang Kipling's "Recessional." Mr. Cairns was in excellent voice, and the playing of the organ. Mr. Fox who conducted Sullivan's Imperial March was splendid.

"OLYMPIC" MADE ATLANTIC RECORD

Big Ship Crossed in Five
Days, Thirteen Hours and
Twelve Minutes.


New York, Nov. 15.—Installation of oil-burning engines in the Olympic, which increased that liner's average speed one knot an hour, made it possible for her to cross the Atlantic on her last trip in record time for her, according to a cable message received Saturday by the White Star Line. The Olympic sailed from New York last Saturday and reached Cherbourg in five days, 13 hours and 12 minutes, travelling at an average speed of 23.3 knots an hour. This is the fastest time in which the Olympic has ever made the trans-Atlantic voyage.
