





This year is census year—Canada is going to measure its own "height and weight in the world-to find out how much it has grown or lost; to see if it is under-nourished or overnourished or what, in citizens.

A nation is curiously like the hu-man body, for its natural growth consists in the reproduction of its individual units-cells in the case of the body, people in the case of of the body, people in the case of the nation. Just as in the body the new material produced must more than make up for the waste and wear or tear, if growth is to result, so in a nation the number of births must be greater than the number of the deaths to make the population increase by natural means.

But nations can grow another way, by a method not very common in the human body itself—that is by the actual addition of new-ready made material from outside, instead of any internal growth. This does happen in the human body sometimes, as when a surgeon transplants skin from one person to another. In the case of a nation, the immigrant is the transplanted skin, forming a ready-made and often very welcome addition. It must be admitted, however, that sometimes immigration results in the same sort of discrepancy of which Jeff complained to Mutt recently—the skin that was transplanted to Jeff's wounded head turned out to be chicken skin and grew feathers instead of hair! Immigrants sometimes introduce 'hairasing' methods of a like bizarre character.

DEATH? The institute in co-operation with the Child Welfare Association and the Social Service Council has been making a special study of the situation in 1920, as shown by physicians reports to the local registrar of vital statistics, Mr. Samuel Baker, city clerk.

STARTLING FIGURES. These figures give an idea of the real causes of infant deaths very different from those which most people casually hold. For instance, no less than 60 per cent of the total loss was due to causes operating before the child was actually born at all—that means to conditions affecting the mother. Only 40 per cent were due to causes which affected the child only after it was born.


