The New Mr. Ernest Drury is the new Premier Prime Minister of Ontario. As yet he hasn't a seat in the Ontario Parliament, but he has been chosen leader by the Farmer's Party and the Lieutenant Governor has recognized the choice by calling him to the Premiership.

Premier Drury has had no actual parliamentary experience. He was however, a Liberal candidate in the Dominion election of 1917 and was defeated. He is an excellent speaker, is well educated and has plenty of ability. Several of the elected men have offered to make way for him, and he will have no trouble in securing a seat.

Just where his majority in the House is to come from is not yet evident. Mayor McBride, Labor M.P.P., has already parted company with the Farmers, and as it stands now, Premier Drury is slightly in the minority, even with the support of all the other Labor members. Possibly he has promises of support from some of the Liberals or Conservatives. If he has not, or if he cannot hold them together with his own Farmer and Labor supporters, he cannot hold the Premiership long. Ontario politics will continue interesting for some time to come.

The Grand The G. T. R. purchase proposition continues to occupy the attention of Parliament. Mr. Fielding's amendment calling for a committee to investigate the whole deal, to value the properties and to report to Parliament before the bill goes through, seems reasonable. The country now owes more than two billions of dollars and the purchase of the Grand Trunk system will commit us to another half-billion. That need not necessarily alarm us, so long as we are sure that we are paying a fair price, so that the railway has a fair chance of carrying itself.

The Great The greatest danger, as we see it, is the price that the three arbitrators may place upon the 180 millions of preferred and common stock. Enough information has been brought out to show that this stock has very little value if any. Yet these three men have the power to fix the value of that stock at any amount up to 180 million of dollars, and Parliament is bound by what they say. This is all the more alarming when it is noted that the Minister of Railways expressed the opinion in Parliament that the arbitrators should be "generous" with the Grand Trunk shareholders. It really looks as though the Canadian people would once again be called upon to pay too much for their whistle. We may be making a bad bargain.

An Awkward The whole situation is embarrassing to the friends of public ownership. We believe the Grand Trunk should be acquired in order to make the National railways a success. The C. N. R., which we already own, is weak in its eastern connections and strong in the west, while the G. T. R. is strong in the east and weak in the west. Together, the two

would make a complete system. But to take a chance at throwing away another hundred millions or so of the people's money makes the most ardent advocate of nationalization pause.

The Commons will no doubt pass the bill. What the Senate will do is unknown, but it is altogether likely that the Grand Trunk Railway system will become the property of the people of Canada.
