QUEBEC AYRSHIRES AND HOLSTEINS

(Continued from last week)

From "Edgewood" we went to "Stonehouse" (Hector Gordon's), where eight more of those consigned are housed. Six of them are imported animals; first to catch the eye is Stockerton Primrose, 3,224, a grand flash-colored cow with a great substance and quality. This is a female that will need to be reckoned with in the showings of the future. Next is Monklund Snowdrop, 2,567, pure white and a great milker. She is followed by Barthesche Lily, 3,435, a three-year-old, a worthy descendant of a dairy family of milkers. She is exceptionally wide and deep. Another worthy three-year-old is Palmerton Heath, 3,635 (imp.), a fish-colored builer of rare sweetness. She was first as a dry two-year-old at Ottawa in 1911. In Stonehouse Fancy, 3,384, we have a two-year-old of great size and substance, and with great promise of udder and teats. Lily of Beth is another two-year-old of great promise as a dairy cow. The last female on Mr. Gordon's list is Kirkland Nellie Bly, 3,536, a very promising yearling. Mr. Gordon is also consigning a very promising two-year-old bull in Whitehill Pretorius, 3,373, a remarkable young bull that was first in a big class at Toronto last fall.

From Cherrylark
From Stonehouse we next went to "Cherrylark" (P. D. McArthur's), the home of the famous Netherhall Milkman (imp.), 2,575. It is worthy of note that nearly all the females in Mr. McArthur's consignment are in calf to this great bull while all the younger animals are sired by him. First in his consignment is a cow, one of which was Cherrylark's Faultless Beauty, 3,438, a magnificent young cow combining great style and substance. Cherrylark Jean, 2,610, was lower set, is wide and very dairy like. Cherrylark Jean, 2,610, is a half sister to Eva, and of the same type, but with strong Record of Performance backing on her dam's side. Cherrylark Queen, 2,628, the first daughter of Milkman, is worthy of her sire, and has a long list of winnings to her credit.

In Dalpudger Lady Taylor (imp.), 3,337, we have a very fine yearling, that will not be long for fall show. Included in Mr. McArthur's consignment are three young bulls by Milkman that will not be long of by discriminating buyers.

Mr. Logan's Offering

From "Cherrylark" we proceeded to "Sunshine," where we found Mr. Logan's lot in fine condition. First to catch the eye in his consignment was Morton Main, 3,586, a grand stylish imported cow, bred for the fall show. She is the winner in the past, and looks like holding her own yet. Another cow of choice attracted our attention was Miss Bell, 3,790, a magnificent dairy cow, and with lots of quality she handles splendidly, and there could be no mistake as to her producing ability. While Floss and May of Manelwood are another pair of cows to gladden the heart of the dairyman, with their prominent udders and big square udders and big well-placed teats. "Aunt of sire" (two male and two female) of the noted Netherhall blood, time round out Mr. Logan's lot, and those young ones will be eagerly sought after, for to me they are a superior "get" to those who won this prize for the same sire at Chicago last year. Two of them are from the same dam, and will make a strong "brood of cows." They are a great attraction.

A short drive in the same direction brings us to "Point Round Farm," the home of Mr. Bryson, who is consigning a very choice consignment. A fine young cow, 3,400, of Point Rhoda of Point Rhoda attracted us immensely, both for her splendid type and evidence of dairy ability. In Jola of Point Round, 3,567, we have another choice one. In fact, we have seen nothing in Canadian bred two-year-olds this season to excel her. Two promising bull calves with strong "A.R." backing completes this lot.

Next in our rotation comes "Stockwood Farm," the home of D. M. Watt, who is consigning a very promising two-year-old. A short walk brings us to "Hilvies," where we found H. Howden's lot in excellent condition; he is also consigning a very attractive pair of flash colored and good type. Another pair of good dairy offers was noted, the home of Duncan McEwen. Another consignment which we visited on a later date was that of J. P. Cavers, where we noted a splendid lot of time dairy and a number of very choice young heifers. They had a breezy look and showed good care, and are the kind to make good cowboys. We understand that three very choice cows are being consigned by S. A. Clemond of Hemmingford, but these we did not have an opportunity of seeing.

Springbrook Ayrshires
From the Huntington drive two other Ayrshire consignments are to be seen, one by McArthur and the other by "Springbrook," formerly known as "Brook." This consignment includes a number of notable animals. At the head of the list is a Scotchborn Goodwin of a great massive imported bull that took some beating this season. He is from one of the famous breeding families of the Ayrshires, and is a real beauty. One of the greatest families to have distinguished themselves in the Americas as milkers, among which was the famous "external half" water house strain Favon's Beauty, who has a world record of 9,242 pounds in 540 pounds butter. His power as a milk producer is amply proven by the fact that he is consigned with him, and among many a proven sire and a show bull should be sure seeing him. Four other heifers and cows are also included in this consignment showing that they are fit for the exception of Laneswood, whose record is 3,582, who also carries one of the breeding of the bull Brownie 7th the world's record holder in the country, and only one opportunity to produce another what is the four daughters of Goodwin referred to above are two spring yearlings and two spring yearlings.


Another consignment is the Huntington D. A. McFarlane of Kelso, who is consigning a very fine young cow of choice Cherrylark breeding, also a promising two-year-old heifer, and a bull finishing an extra dairy yearling. He also consigns a choice young bull.

We also noted on one trip a very choice Holsteins that are also consigned by "Lenton Hill Farm," the home of J. J. Alexander. Here we saw a very fine young cow showing plenty of quality and evidence of producing ability, and a promising bull calf.

Mr. John McEwen of Howick is consigning a pair of good record-setting Black and White in Maudie 2nd and related, 3,088, and Cora, 3,119, 12,38. The latter is a specially promising young cow, milking better than pounds day on an average of 100.

Huntington County is consigning two choice lots, the four cows of "Cherrylark," the one of J. J. Alexander, being an extra valuable consignment. The choice was Barones Mercedes 2nd, a beautiful young cow; we have never seen more favorably than any animal than this, as her quality is apparent in every line, and she is very attractive. Her breeding is of choice, being closely related to the great cows that made the wonderful records at Ottawa last year. Her half sister, Princess Enn, 6,731, is also a grand cow, but with hardly the finish of Barones.

Two very useful sorts are also in Maud of Riverview, 7,300, and Daisy, 3,152, both of which are of constitution and productive ability. The consignment of M. D. Brown of H.
