In the elections on Thursday last the Mowat Government was sustained by a majority of about 20, as indicated over that of the late Legislature. The Liberals stood: - 64

Doubtful..... 1

The Liberals profess to have expected this and consequently were not surprised; but the result was certainly a great disappointment to the Conservatives. Mr. Meredith and his supporters evidently based their expectations of victory on the sectarian and educational issues, and the result should be sufficient to deter any party from again seeking to gain power by an appeal to the religious prejudices of the people of Ontario.
