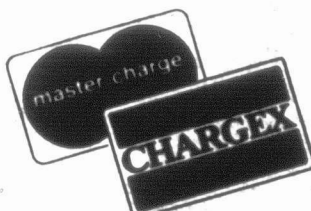

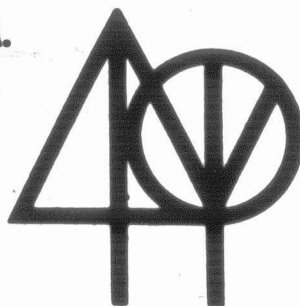

Criticism policy criticized

Brampton trustee Gary Heighington says that a Peel Board of Education's policy prevents trustees from commenting, in any manner, on board decisions.

Heighington was criticized for his earlier remarks on a board decision to reject the extension of the core French program in Peel schools. Heighington was quoted as saying that if the Peel Parents For French wanted a different decision, they'd have to work to replace existing Mississauga and Caledon trustees in the next election.

Chairman Bill Kent says the remarks by the first-term trustee violate a section of the board's procedural bylaw which states that "no member shall reflect upon any vote of the board except for the purpose of moving that such vote be rescinded."

Heighington introduced a notice of motion last week to eliminate that statement. He feels a preceding section is sufficient. It states that "no member shall use offensive language in or against the board or any member thereof."

Heighington has apologized to those Mississauga and Caledon trustees who voted for the French core program, but not to those who voted against it. His notice of motion will be discussed at the board meeting next Tuesday.

Busing plan rejected

In a 9-6 recorded vote, trustees have rejected a study to determine the cost of providing busing to French immersion courses for Grade 1 to 4 students.

Ward 9 trustee Norah Busby, who has a group of parents in her ward who want busing to Vista Heights Public School, said the study should be undertaken.

If busing is provided "it avoids the label of an elitist program," she said. Parents have said that the immersion courses should be accessible to all. Under the present policy, immersion students are guaranteed lunchroom supervision but must provide their own transportation.

Malton's Terry Lewis suggested that the change in policy would "open the floodgate" to enrolment in immersion programs. The cost of busing could increase significantly, he felt.

Busby countered that no busing would be provided for kindergarten students so only parents who are serious about the instruction would take advantage of the busing later.

Talks resume in bid to raise cafeteria prices

"Everyone's benefiting from the food service in Peel, but unfortunately we're not."

With those words, Ted Graham, vice-president of marketing for VS Services Ltd., explained why his company wants to increase the prices of many menu items it serves in Peel school cafeterias.

Graham told trustees last week that Peel has the cheapest food prices in Ontario. He said teachers get "personalized, standardized service and can get a full course meal for 75 to 95 cents. The \$40,000 cost of that service wasn't mentioned in the tender by the board, Graham noted, saying that the cost contributed to the \$92,652 loss VS suffered in Peel last year. It expects a \$81,200 loss this year.

Graham said that although Peel negotiators have agreed on an increase in the price of milk and french fries, other increases are warranted. Graham claimed that the tender by the Peel board was for two years of service, but the contract signed was only for one year.

The Peel board, which got an injunction against VS to prevent food price

increases, says that VS must have board approval before increasing prices.

"No food service company would ever agree to holding prices for two years," says Graham.

After an in-camera discussion, the board decided to renew negotiations with VS. Talks took place this week.

Food prices in Peel schools, are 20 cents for milk; 25 cents for doughnuts, 45 cents for french fries; 30 cents for ice cream; 85 cents for entrees, 60 cents for salads; 60 cents for hamburgers, 40 cents for hot dogs, 45 cents for pizza; and 70 cents for fish and chips.

Road closed
