I belong to The Dream Team. The Dream Team is a national church committee whose only assignment is to dream and brainstorm about future possibilities for the

Actually to satisfy officialdom the group is called The Committee to Study Style of Operation. We prefer the name Dream Team, but some of things we dream up are more like nightmares. However, most of the ideas are kind of fun to contemplate and very often not that original.

For example, the recurring dream team theme: whenever possible the church should avoid capital debt, remain organizationally flexible and invest in people. Those ideas are not so dramatically new, but if they do not recur, even such obvious ideas are soon forgotten.

Investing in people not only includes putting money directly where it can help meet people's needs. It also has to do with buying the

skills and talents and ideas of people to help make the church more effective.

And when the church is hung up on capital debts it becomes very ulterior in its approach to people. People tend to be seen only as a source of funds, as if they existed for the sake of the church instead of vice versa.

It would be cynical and dishonest to generalize, but there is lots of evidence around that occasionally we get sucked into the sabbath numbers game only because we need the money that a larger number of people can provide.

Recently a leader in one of Recently a leader in one of two churches planning a merger asked some very revealing questions under the heading, "What Are The Advantages?" "Will the merger fill the church with people On Sunday? Will the merger increase the building of new churches? . . . Will the merger increase the pledges to the church? . . .

Will the merger cause more

it's difficult to be simon pure. As matter of fact, when isn't it difficult?

One example of avoiding capital debt is the congregation that meets in a barn. It gives away 50 per cent of its budget and asks its members to join secular organizations rather than segregate themselves within the congregation. When the Dream Team

meets, we make a point of phoning for ideas to any member who isn't able to make the meeting. There is one guy out in Thompson, Manitoba who churns out ideas at a very prolific rate.

Last time he came up with an idea that isn't really new, but his approach was new. He suggested renting a truck so we could drive from coast to coast and steal every pew from every church. We're afraid to phone him again. He may suggest burning all the churches to make way for the Church — big "C"

We're not always serious about our ideas. You'd be surprised how often we are serious. But by God it's fun to belong to a group assigned. the freedom to think its young men to go into the thoughts out loud,
