Bill of Rights

This matter discussed by Cabinet on January 21st.

-this course considered -

1. Await introduction of bill by Diefenbaker 2. If bill introduced - refer to special

- committee to consider causes, etc. 3. To declare in Speech from the Throne that
- 5. To declare in Speech from the Throne that government intends to appoint special committee to consider advisability of introducing bill of rights in Parliament.

-Cabinet generally favoured this course -resolution to be carefully drafted and considered

Argument against having any introduction of bill of rights --1. United Nations - an obligation placed on the United Nations by its Charter is that of preserving human rights

- -the Economic and Social Council is considering a declaration of human rights. The commission is to make a report on the same, and Parliament should await that report and have our legislation, if necessary, in harmony with same
- 2. Problems to be dealt with regard to human rights are in large part under provincial jurisdiction

3. views of provinces should be heard.

Main Argument -

- no need for any bill as rights are already secured under existing legislation. e.g., habeas corpus.

trial by jury, etc.

Note attitude of Powers and Croll in support of Diefenbaker.
