"kept by the Paymaster and as it was not necessary to give the cash box to the adjutant over the westend I had no reason to believe that he had parted with their possession. I did not have a key to the cash box. I had no knowledge of the combination of the safe, which I understood had been changed while I was on New Year's leave by reason of the fact that it had been necessary for the adjutant to have the old combination during the Paymaster's absence on Christmas leave. After the shortage was discovered I examined the eash box with the Paymaster and saw marks which indicated an attempt to pry it open. This was the first time that I had seen these marks and they were not present when I had occasion under a former Paymaster three or four months previously to handle the each box. The marks were not visible from the cutside when the lid was elected. They were only noticeable when the lid was open.

The safe was acquired when the former Paymester was there but after he first changed the combination it worked very stiffly and at times required two hands to turn the dial. It is still stiff and sime 8 Jm on one occasion it was impossible to work the combination at all.
