Q. How much did you have in your truck?

A. Six bottles.

Q. And did you know how much Brisson had in his, if any? The question has been misunderstood, the six bottles were in Brisson's truck, not his.

Q. Did you have any in your truck at all?

A. I had no liquor in my truck.

Q. How did you know the bottles Brisson had in his truck?

A. The bottles were those small bottles for tomato juice.

Q. Would they be a pint or more or less?

A. Just about a pint.

Q. Would you recognize the liquor jar that you saw in the Fortness if you were to see it again?

A. Yes sir.

Q. At what time did you and Brisson leave the Fortness between 3 and 4?

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
