That wonderful and additional prestige to any herd he brought to the 77 head, including little calves, probably would have made the netted herd of \$3900, nearly \$190 each an average that is comparatively small with that of a dispersion sale ever held in Canada.

Mr. Anderson we believe, was highly satisfied with the result, and his happy expression on the faces of the buyers, to get on with the rousing cheer, succeeded him at the close, was sufficient proof that to him also the day at "Evergreen" had been pleasantly and profitably spent.

Mr. Montgomery wielded the hammer in the afternoon, and worked up to secure the highest price for each offering.

It is hardly fair to conclude this report without referring to the hospitality of the afternoon and ladies who aided him, both before and after the sale. And it is also to be noted that the good gentleman thoughts in the minds of those fortunate enough to be present, was the fact that this event was a dispersion thereby preventing the repetition of many similar cases of such a happy nature.

SALE OF AYRSHIRES.

The auction sale of Ayrshires at Terra Nova Farm, Que., owned by J. D. Duncan, who owns and operates the largest cream dairy and creamery plants in the City of Montreal, on the 4th inst., drew a large crowd of local buyers from the whole of the province. The stock was in the best of condition and had been nearly all imported from Scotland. That Ayrshire breeders of this district are coming to know the breeding of Ayrshires was proved by the fact that when they saw an animal of Auchencruin, Lanescock, Netherland, Bardecree or Ardye was the animal usually went at a good figure.

Janet 7th, a beautiful three-year-old, bred by John McAllister and sired by Not a Minute, was sold for \$1000. It was evident from the start that Mr. McAllister wanted this fine bull for his herd. It was evident from Howick's notes that he had promised by some \$1000. The bid was finally realized \$800. There was then bidding for one of the two-year-old heifers reported by Mr. Duncan last summer and among these were some choice animals. The total sale amounted to \$12,850. The fact of there being a few bull calves ranging from two days to two weeks old, which sold for low prices, brought down the general average.

ANENT CANADA'S NEW RECORD COW

Editor, Farm and Dairy—We have just completed an official test. Brooklands Korydyke Netherland, No. 11,745, of 566 lbs. milk, 30.14 lbs. of butter, and 2.73 lbs. of butter in seven days. This beats the record of 504 lbs. of milk, 23.6 lbs. of butter, her 30 days' dry cow living by four milk, 120.45 lbs. of fat, 159.57 lbs. of butter, and 10.7 lbs. of Canadian record by 22 lbs. of butter.

This was this to be a most remarkable record, owing to Brooklands Netherland being only five years old. Had she been a year older she would have gone in the senior four-year class, a most remarkable feat, as only one cow in the world has ever done this. She came in when she was four years old, and has since had a calf every year since. This year she milked over the middle of February and freshened again March 26th, having just weaned 'rest. Then just 17 days after calving she made this remarkable record.

Brooklands Korydyke Netherland's offspring consists of three daughters and a son. The son is one and the spring, and sired by Pictorial Korydyke Lad, No. 7933, bred by J. W. W. Howick, N.Y. His four nearest dams average 10 lbs. of butter in seven days. He is a half-brother to the sire of his first prize aged bull, owned by A. C. Howick, on the Dominion Exhibition last fall.

We have in our herd the mother, one, one brother, two daughters. One of this new champion cow. The two daughters and one son she made over 10 lbs. of butter, and last year of her 29 day record she gave 85 lbs. of milk, it being her largest amount of milk produced in a day while under test.

Brooklands Korydyke Netherland is perfectly Brooklands Korydyke straight bred, well sprung, rich, nice mellow milk, and a good udder. She has a network of milk veins running up under from the udder. A very large vein runs from the udder to the neck, when she freshens her udder measured over six feet.

To encourage the breeding of Standard Bred horses, the Canadian Standard Breed Horse Society, is this year donating \$500 to each of the following shows for the best Standard Bred brood mare with foal in her side: Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto; Canadian Industrial Exhibition, Toronto; Central Canada Exhibition, Ottawa; Edmonton Exhibition Association, Edmonton; Great Eastern Exhibition, Sherbrooke; Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition, Halifax; Regina Exhibition, Regina; and the Ontario Fair Association, London; Saskatoon Industrial Exhibition, Saskatoon. All animals must be registered in the official classes at those Exhibitions, must be recorded in the Standard Bred Book. The Canadian Standard Bred Stud Book was not opened until the fall of 1910, but fulfilled the year. All owners should have their horses appear. It is therefore desirable that application for registration be made at once to the Registrar, International Live Stock Records, Ottawa, at once. The cost for registration is \$150 for the first year, and \$25 for subsequent annual membership fee is \$2.

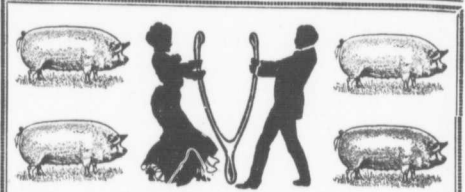
