Mr. Iwai, Japanese Student at Trinity, has also given us a short talk about the Mission work at Matsumoto, and Mr. Clarke, another Trinity Student, who has done Mission work at Minden in our own Diocese, told us something of the work there.

2nd.—By answering the Missionary questions. Those who answered the questions or heard the answers read will, I am sure, agree that they were most interesting.

Our Branch is progressing. May I beg you one and all, each to do her share to keep it progressing and not to be absent from the meetings if you can possibly avoid it. I think I cannot do better than to close my report with a quotation from the last Leaflet which applies to us all:—"One person cannot do everything. And I am only one. But I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. If I can do something I ought to do it. If I ought to do it, it is my duty. If it is my duty, it must be done."
