BIG CUTS IN RATES TO PASSENGERS.

Transatlantic Lines Sending out Circulars Announcing Reductions for Fares.—Affect Steamers Calling at Ports in Europe and America.

Montreal, Feb. 2.—Circulars have been mailed from the local offices of the White Star Line notifying the following reductions from Canada for ports on the Continent of Europe.

For third class passengers, fares have been cut from \$35 by Laurentic, Megantic, and Teutonic to \$25; by Canada and Dominion from \$35 to \$23. Westbound prepaid rates for third class passengers from all continuetal ports to Canada have been reduced from \$29.50 to \$27.

The reduction also applies to vessels belonging to the Canada Line.
