

Election Postponed.

BELGRADE, Servia, July 25 .- The election of members of the Servian parliament has been postponed and the members of the old parliament have been ordered to meet in special session to-morrow to discuss the situation between Austria and Servia. The Servian press in its comments is divided in opinion some of the newspapers demanding the refusal of and others compliance with the Austrian Government's demands.

Evacuating Belgrade.

LONDON, July 25 .- An Exchange Telegraph Company's despatch from Vienna says news was received there to-day to the effect that the Servian gofernment was making preparations to evacuate Belgrade, the capital. It adds that many of the troops already have left the city, which is considered untenable and are retiring toward the South.


