



## GAULLAUX IN OWN DEFENCE

### Ex-Premier Will Deny the Charges of Treason Laid Against Him

Paris, Dec. 21.—The Chamber of Deputies will hold a special session Saturday to discuss Deputy Paisant's report which concludes with the following words:

"From the foregoing facts there are sufficiently grave presumptions of his having during the war worked for the destruction of our alliances, thus aiding the enemy's progress, which is a crime under article 76 to 79 of the penal code."

The report of Deputy Paisant, in the name of the committee, was published last night. It points out that the committee of eleven was not empowered to investigate whether Deputy Gaillaux and Loustalot were guilty of the charges brought against them or what jurisdiction was applicable to them, but merely if the facts alleged were sufficiently grave to necessitate the opening of legal proceedings. In deciding to authorize the authorization demanded by the government, the committee says it intends in no way to prejudice the question of culpability.

Former Premier Gaillaux is quoted by the report as protesting against the accusations as untrue and affirming his patriotism. He shows by speeches at Maners. M. Gaillaux declared that the man, who at the present moment would for personal ends propose a traitorous peace in defiance of alliances and treaties would perjure French honor and commit a crime.

The report declares that at a time when any form of secret diplomacy is opposed vehemently, a man, however highly placed, who arrogates to himself the right to undertake mysterious negotiations for peace, commits a most formidable attack on the safety of the state.

Premier Clemenceau explained to the committee that it would be the duty of the judges to decide whether investigations led to a charge of interference with the enemy. The case would then go before a court martial, or if it led to a political crime it would be tried by the high court.

## EXMAS LEAVE FOR MANY M.H.C. PATIENTS

### Boys Unable to Leave Hospital will be Given big Time by People

There may be no German tinsel on the Christmas trees but holiday cheer will not be missing in the wards of the military convalescent hospital and sanatoria for the wounded boys who must stay under the care of the physicians and nurses during the Christmas season while their comrades, who are more advanced in convalescence, are allowed to go home.

Lt.-Col. J. J. Sharples, C. O. of the Military Hospitals Command, has issued a circular letter to the O. C. of each unit authorizing him to show all men who are regarded fit by the medical officer, and in good standing, to go home on leave from December 23 to January 3. This order does not apply to the T. B. patients in the sanatoria who will remain in the institutions during the Christmas season except by special permission.

The boys at the sanatoria will be given their leave at another time because of the danger of overdoing if they are allowed to go home at Christmas. They may unknowingly overtax their strength and retard recovery many months in the succession of parties arranged in every community for returned men who are honored by their friends in general as well as by their friends. This decision was reached in the conference of medical officers caring for tubercular soldiers in Canada upon the basis of past experience, and put into effect in the interest of the boys.

Everybody Helps

The soldiers' comforts committee and patriotic societies have determined that Christmas cheer and not loneliness shall fill the vacuum when they depart. The wards, corridors, dining halls and recreation rooms will be bright with bunting and Christmas greens, in the evenings there will be concerts and parties in keeping with their condition, and every effort will be made to keep the boys happy.

Aside from the endeavors of the patriotic societies and individuals in the Military Hospitals Commission has authorized a full-fledged Christmas menu, including turkey, plum pudding, and all "the fixings."

The officers in command and dietitians will do all in their power to make the season happy for the boys who cannot so home.

## HOSPITALS ON WHEELS BEAR WOUNDED WEST

### Cars Provided to Transfer Bed Cases Across Dominion by M.H.C.

Many visitors to Canada have praised the hospitals and sanatoria supplied by the government through the Military Hospitals Commission for the treatment of returned soldiers, and the schools conducted in connection with them for the vocational training and re-education, but the hospitals on wheels, the ambulances, which are shot from coast to coast over the rails, bearing the bed cases brought back from England, elude them.

In these cars, complete with wards, dispensary, kitchen and nurses' quarters, 22 bed cases bound for inland points are perfectly cared for. The beds are standard hospital cots, so spread with white linen and bolstered in pillows or wool make a weary salesman weep with envy; there are solicitous nurses in perky white caps, and with every unit of two cars a physician to look after the men.

One car carries all the service facilities, a complete ward equivalent to drawing room accommodation in the regular sleepers car reserved for the nurses, a diet kitchen, dispensary, and a compartment for the stretcher-bearers. The remainder of the space is given to eight cots for patients.

Side Entrance to Cars

A special feature of the car is a side entrance giving easy access for the stretchers so that the patients may be moved with the least possible inconvenience to them. All cases are brought in this way and transferred to the adjoining ward car through doors made specially wide for the purpose. To protect the men already in the first car, heavy curtains are drawn in cold weather.

The second car is a complete ward giving sufficient space for 14 cots. The upper berths are retained even though they are never used since they provide good space for carrying linen and supplies, and in case of a great emergency certain cases might be carried there.

By arranging these cars in units of two they may be attached to an ordinary passenger train or made up into a special train.
