He was called to the pastorate of the 1st Cornwallis Baptist Church Canard and there he laboured most earnestly efficiently and with the best results to the spiritual life of the community in which he labored. With his wife the religious tone of the whole circuit he touched was advanced in the interests of the Kingdom of the God he served

At Canard two children were born to Dr. and Mrs Kempton; Rev. Austen T, Kempton M. A now pastor at the bridge Mass, and a disciple of Christ following in the footsteps of his beloved father and William who died quite early in life bringing deepest sorrow to his parents.
