The execution of the plot was entrusted to the leader of the Moscow branch, a man named Kazantseff, who came to St. Petersburg the latter part of May and secured employment in a factory as a common labor-

who came to St. Petersburg the latter part of May and secured employment in a factory as a common laborer. He befriended several of his fellow workmen, and after announcing himself as an anarchist he enlisted four men to assist him in carrying out his commission. It was planned to throw a bomb at Count Witte's carriage from the window of a cheap boarding-house on Kamenny Island, while the count was on his way to attend a meeting of the Council of the Empire.

The plot, however, was betrayed by the revolutionist burean, which gave Count Witte warning. The four workmen continued to pretend loyalty to Kazantseff in order not to arouse his suspicion. The day for the assassination was fixed, and that morning Kazantseff led his supposed assistants to a wood in the vicinity of St. Petersburg in order to get the bombs from a secret hiding-place, but at this point the four men turned on Kazantseff and killed him, carrying out the sentence of death passed upon him.

CABRERA HAS REVENGE

Eight Score Prominent Guatemalans Thrown Into Prison.

Mexico City, July 3.—Word has been received in Mexico City that President Cabrera in Guatemala has caused the arrest of 160 citizens of that republic on the charge of alleged complicity in the recent attempt to assassinate him. All were thrown into prison, and later herded into squads of twenty, and tried in groups.

Two bands have been tried, and many of the accused sentenced to death. Among the men imprisoned are some of the most wealthy and prominent men in the country. These men have long been on Cabrera's black-list, and the charges against them were trumped up for political reasons.
