### CARS DERAILED

Slight Accident on the Grand Trunk Early This Morning—Traffic Delayed

This morning, about 5 o'clock, a double-header freight train, under Conductor James Clark and Engineers Hooper and Hanney, happened with a serious accident on the Grand Trunk track, near the Dowsley Works.

The train had just crossed the Chatham junction and was going at the rate of two miles an hour, when the axle of a Wabash car was broken. Three cars were thrown off the track and the track was torn up for about 100 feet. The Wabash car, No. 62,219, which was loaded with coal, was badly damaged, as was also a Lehigh Valley car, No. 69,254, loaded with stores.

The Windsor Auxiliary was quickly summoned and the track will soon be cleared.

### INTERESTING LIFE

J. M. Jones Who Passed Away in Michigan—Was an Educated Man

His many friends will be sorry to learn of the death of James Munroe Jones, who is 84 years of age, being born January 10, 1821, and died November 6, 1905. For the past fifty years he has been a very highly esteemed colored citizen of this city.

Mr. Jones was master of arts, being a graduate of the Oberlin College, Ohio. He taught school for a number of years, but is better known as an experienced gunsmith, and during the first visit of the Prince of Wales (now King Edward VII.) to Canada he made a brace of pistols to present to the Prince, but on account of some disagreement between the members of the committee, they were not presented. It was very interesting to hear Mr. Jones tell about his experiences and the war between the Northern and Southern States. He was well versed in politics and could talk in seven different languages. For the last few years deceased has been living on the corner of Head and Thames streets. A widow, three daughters and one son survive him. The family are Emma Jones, of Ann Arbor; Sophia, a graduate of the Ann Arbor Institute; Emily, who is teaching school in the Southern States, and George Jones, of Ann Arbor.

Killed at Sydney Mines.  
Sydney, N. S., Nov. 8.—Yesterday afternoon a fatality occurred at the Sydney mines, by which Edward Vickers lost his life. He was a coal cutter, and while working in one of the rooms a heavy fall of stone tumbled from the roof, killing him instantly.

A Woman Shot.  
Winnipeg, Nov. 8.—A woman inmate of a disorderly house at Kenora, Ont., is dying from a bullet wound. The assailant is unknown.

Explosion of Powder Kills 4.  
Belleville, Ill., Nov. 8.—The press house of the Phoenix Paper Works at Phoenixville, a few miles from here, exploded yesterday afternoon, killing four men. Several others were injured.

Leather Cutters Strike.  
Montreal, Nov. 8.—Leather cutters in Tremblay's shoe factory are on strike for a minimum wage of \$12 per week, and the strike may extend to all factories in the city.
