The Junior Exhibition.

The Rhetorical Exhibition of the Junior class of the College took place last Tuesday evening. Although the weather was far from pleasant, the large hall was fairly well filled.

The exhibition reflected credit upon students and professors alike. Of the class of twenty-one, eight delivered orations: Mr. Lockhart, of P. E. I.; Miss M. E. Archibald, of Wolfville; Miss Margaret W. Coates, of Kingston, N. B.; W. R. Foot, of Grafton; R. B. Griffin, of New Minas; J. L. Minard, of Mt. Whately, N. B.; M. A. McLennan, of Montague, P. E. I.; and H. A. Stuart, of Cumberland Bay, N. B.

The essays were all good and creditably delivered. Mr. Lockhart in vigorous style pictured the condition of Sparta, and the present widening sentiment of liberality and democracy. Miss Archibald pictured the present condition of high-caste women in India. Her diction graceful, her delivery pleasing, the essay was well received. Miss Coates, in showing the place of Columbus in the history of civilization, evinced intelligent study and originality. Her essay was excellent. Mr. Foot discussed "The Prohibition in Canada." Showing that the enforcement of a prohibitory law by a majority is not a plain thing, the speaker pointed out that the probability of such a result is into one of public opinion. To ascertain this, it is necessary, it is necessary, it is necessary, this perhaps approached the most nearly the idea of an oration. Mr. Foot has many of the requirements of a successful public speaker. Mr. Griffin discussed with clearness and force "The Organization of Labor." His delivery was good. "The Social Value of the Church," received candid but just treatment by Mr. Minard. His remarks were deliberate but conclusive. Mr. McLennan discussed "The Literary Value of Vergil's Georgics." The poem was treated in its theological, ethical and philosophical aspects. This essay showed careful study of the greatest work of the greatest Roman poet. The last essay was delivered by Mr. Stuart. His subject was "Parthen Ideals." Truly great men are the embodiments of great ideals. Those men who threw their lives into the struggle for liberty during the English Revolution, recognizing the ownership of law, ready to yield obedience to it, and characterized by strong faith, thus entertained the highest ideals of liberty, life and progress, and embodied them. We may trust the future of our nation if into it are carried these Parthen Ideals. Judging from the essays delivered, the present Junior class will bring no discredit to Acadia. The music, which was interspersed at appropriate intervals during the evening, was highly appreciated and received with vigorous applause. Miss Trevelyan, of the Seminary, sang a solo to the accompaniment of Miss Bayren. Miss Marie Ritchie, also of the Seminary, and Mr. Magson, of Kentville, favored the audience with a violin and bass violin rendering. The quartette of the singing, Messrs MacMillan, Miller, Stuart and Mickelson, gave a fine rendering with good effect. The exhibition was a success. On Wednesday the majority of the students left by the different trains to enjoy the Christmas holidays.
