TEA SHORTAGE - HIGHER PRICES

In 1920, so much more tea was pro-

duced than required throughout the
world, that the market dropped to a
very low level. The situation was so
serious for the growers that they ag-
reed to reduce their production 50
per cent during 1921. Consumption,
which has increased tremendously,
and the production of tea being cur-
tailed, has resulted in the highest prices
for tea in years. The recent re-
duction of four pence per pound on
tea tax in England has further stimu-
lated consumption, which means
that even higher prices may soon be
expected.

HONORS FOR CARLETON COUNTY ROY

At the recent closing exercises of
the University of New Brunswick the
prize of \$100 offered by the Imperial
Order of the Daughters of the Empire
for the highest average marks in the
fourth year by a returned soldier,
was presented to D. R. Bishop,
of River de Chute, by Mrs. Robert
Pitt Randolph, of Fredericton.

D. Raymond Bishop was born at
River de Chute, and received his early
education there and at the Andover
Grammar School, graduating from the
latter place in the year 1915. He en-
tered U. N. B. that fall and after star-
ing at college a year enlisted in the
fall of 1916 in the 8th Siege Battery
going overseas in the early part of
1917. He was wounded while serv-
ing in France and after three years'
chance from college returned in the
fall of 1918. While at college he
has taken a prominent part in debat-
ing and football. He was also man-
ager of the U. N. B. hockey team for
the season of 1922. He graduates with
the degree of B. A.
