LADYSMITH MEN CONFESSED GUILT

taining the powder through the window of McKinnon's house. Witness ran down to the Cecil, crossed to First avenue near the Smith property and then between the Chronicle office and Ryan's butcher shop. The fuse was lit with a match. He went down to the barber shop and met a number there. He got a pot of coffee and sandwiches. Some one said the work was done and one man passed said "If we know anything like that we should keep it to ourselves. Witness gave the names of those present in the pool room. The following Thursday Jackson came into the pool room but did not talk to him. He warned Jackson not to leave. Witness had been with Jackson and Adams earlier in the evening of the explosion. Jackson said "Let us get the Temperance Hotel; Adams has the stuff." The latter gave one bundle to Jackson and hid the other in the grass.

John Michek testified to sitting on the Canadian Bank of Commerce steps when the Temperance Hotel explosion took place. He left for the Europe Hotel. He saw Stacous, Jackson and Adams. Jackson asked if he knew where McKinnon lived. He replied that he did not. They went up Roberts street to the city hall. He left them and went down to the bank. That was all he knew of the trouble. Paul Deconink, the next witness, gave straightforward evidence. In the night of August 12 witness had occasion to go behind the Temperance Hotel, where he saw Stacous and Jackson. This was twenty minutes before the explosion. Later on McKinnon said he was going up to McKinnon's and to keep the crowd back. After the explosion, with others he went up to McKinnon's house. He detailed his further movements which had little bearing on the case.

Henry Dyer in many essential details corroborated the evidence of Deconink. He saw Stacous and Jackson standing in the rear of the Temperance Hotel before the explosion at that building. He did not see Mike Adams. At the bank he spoke to Paul Deconink. After the explosion, he went up to McKinnon's. James Marshall testified that he was in the rear of the Temperance Hotel before the explosion, when he saw Stacous, Jackson and Adams. He heard someone mention powder and he left.

Edward Williams said he saw Stacous, Adams and Jackson shortly after the explosion.

John Fisher said he had been around with Edward Williams before the explosion. He saw Stacous, Jackson and Adams and some others who

did not know. There was a big crowd there. Stacous asked who could fix the powder, and Adams said he could.

Daniel Gordon remembered the explosion at the Temperance Hotel. Saw Stacous, Adams and Jackson behind the hotel. When the explosion took place he saw a flash of light.

Thomas Timothy gave evidence as to his stay on the island with Jackson. Jackson had said "something about dynamite," but he was not sure what he had said. The witness was closely pressed by the magistrate to tell all he knew, but the evidence was not conclusive.

The sensation of the hearing came when William Jackson asked to be sworn. He was duly warned as to the effect his statement would have on his trial. While his testimony was not well connected it was strongly corroborative of Stacous' evidence. He testified that he had met Stacous at the Temperance Hotel, when the first explosion had taken place. He also told of his visit to the McKinnon home when the powder was thrown. Cross-examined, he said he was with Stacous and Adams behind the Temperance Hotel. He didn't know where Adams had got the powder. It was wrapped in rags. One portion of the powder was on the grass. They then went up to McKinnon's house. Stacous picked up a rock and threw it at McKinnon's house and then Adams threw the dynamite into the house. The fuse was lighted by Adams. After that he went down to Stacous' barber shop.

The accused Adams then took the stand. He is a foreigner and it was difficult at times to follow his story. Briefly stated he told about going to the Temperance Hotel on the evening of August 12, and the throwing of the first bomb. Stacous and Jackson had asked him if he had any powder, and he said "yes." After the first explosion he left for McKinnon's house with Stacous and Jackson. He told Stacous not to throw the dynamite that he would do it himself. He asked Stacous to throw a rock, and then he threw the dynamite. His evidence fully corroborated in important details the evidence given by Stacous.

Magistrate Stewart then committed Jackson and Adams to stand trial at the first court of competent jurisdiction on the charge of attempted murder.

Stacous and Michek were bound over to give evidence in the sum of \$300 each and two securities of \$250 each. The other witnesses were bound in their personal recognizances of \$500 each.
