Telegraphic Ticks

Henry Farman, Friday afternoon succeeded in driving an aeroplane a distance of 235 metres through the air, thus breaking the record of 220 metres held by Santos Dumont.

Surrounded by the members of his family, Rev. Dr. Potts, the Educational Secretary of the Methodist Church died at his home at 8 Prince Arthur avenue, at Toronto, 8:30 o'clock Friday morning.

Friday afternoon the system of wireless trans-Atlantic communication passed from its experimental stage in a formal announcement made by the inventor to a practical basis, and for the first time in the history of the world messages are being transmitted and received to and from England commercially.

The Postoffice Department reports that as a result of the new agreement to the second class postal rates between Canada and the United States, which went into effect last spring, the flood of cheap American newspapers and magazines, used merely as advertising medium, has practically ceased to pour into Canada.

The Danish steamer Alfred Erlandsen has been wrecked on the rocks off Castle Point, near Stab's Head, Scotland. She went ashore Friday night during a gale and twenty of her crew were drowned. A lifeboat, which spent the night looking for survivors, had a narrow escape, being frequently swept by heavy seas.

The preliminary hearing of Jas. McDonald, brought to North Sydney from Summerside, P. E. I., charged with stealing \$3,500 from the postoffice of that town, came up Friday. MacDonald voluntarily gave evidence to the effect that he had taken the mail bag with its contents before he realized the gravity of his action and had spent but \$200. He was committed to the Supreme Court.

The statements in the Conservative press that Hon. A. B. Aylesworth will be compelled to retire from the government owing to deafness, are not warranted by the facts. Mr. Aylesworth's ear trouble is giving away before treatment. There is no thought of his leaving the Cabinet or retiring from public life.

Dr. Charles A. Hodgetts, chief medical officer of Ontario, who is in Ottawa, in the course of an interview drew attention to the fact that there are annually 2,500 deaths from tuberculosis in Ontario. It is obvious, he says, that the municipalities will have to brace up and face the problem of combating the disease. Dr. Hodgetts says that the general health of the people is good. There is no small-pox and not a great deal of contagious disease.

Alexander Duclos, who a year ago last March shot Alphonse Desrois, in his office at Montreal and who has since been held as insane, has since been released by government orders on medical advice. Duclos was at the time

brought before the courts on a criminal charge, but was subsequently taken to the insane asylum, whence he has escaped twice. His present release is made on the report of two physicians that Duclos is now sane.

The famous old Reserve mine, the standby of the Dominion Coal Company, which has been running for the past half century or more, with practically no delay in the working of the pit, has but a few more years when it will cease to exist. Dominion No. 1 is fast working towards Reserve on one side, and the mine itself will eventually be tunneled through to No. 4. It is claimed that six years at the outside will be the limit that the Reserve can run at its present rate of production.

Despatches from Newcastle, N. S. W., state that a serious 'creep' has occurred in the old mine workings under the residential quarter of the city. Buildings on an area of fifteen acres are affected and the damage so far is estimated at \$500,000. There has been no loss of lives. A mine creep is a slow movement surrounding the excavations to replace that taken out. The movement often causes a change of levels on the surface.

Thos. F. Collins, confined in jail at Hopewell Cape, Albert Co., sentenced to be hanged on the 15th of November for the murder of Mary Ann McAuley at New Ireland, according to his own story, is a pugilist and has appeared in the ring in the old country. Collins says he fought six rounds on one occasion before coming to this country with Billy Britt, brother of Jimmy Britt, the former light-weight champion of America. In the sixth round Collins says he was knocked out by Britt by a blow over the heart.

Joseph Dettinger aged 59 years of York, Pa., committed suicide in an unusual manner. Placing a stick of dynamite in his mouth and holding it in his right hand, Dettinger exploded the dynamite blowing off his head and shattering the hand that held the explosive. Last Tuesday, Dettinger, who was a well digger by occupation, lost a sum of money said to have been \$50, and brooding over this is believed to have caused the desire to end his life.

Dr. Loir, an eminent French physician, was recently engaged by the medical faculty of Laval University. As he is a nephew of the famous Pasteur, and gave great promise, Laval authorities thought they had secured a find. It now transpires that Archbishop Bruchési has refused to allow Laval to employ Dr. Loir, his objection being that Madame Loir is suing for divorce and until this is settled his services will be dispensed with by Laval. Friday he was given a years' leave of absence, this being the time he was engaged for in the first instance.

A Dawson despatch says:—"J. E. McDonald, a Dawson jeweler, was arrested at White Horse yesterday on the arrival of the steamer Selkirk from Dawson, charged with complicity in the robbery of \$40,000 from the registered mail in Dawson July 20. This makes four arrests in the case, the first being Richard Hall, the second George Kincaid, chief government foreman who was arrested at Selkirk, and who committed suicide, the third, Tom Vaughan, held on suspicion with a blanket charge of vagrancy against him, and the fourth, McDonald. Other arrests are expected to follow.

Steeves was a well to do farmer and was on his way to work when struck by the train.
