Saturday, April 24.—A large quantity of produce was offered on Central Market this morning, and business was brisk. The market was the largest for some time, but there were not many changes in prices. The first cucumbers of the season were offered by Geo. Wild this morning, and sold at 25 to 35c each. BATTLE AT CONSTANTINOPLE.

London, April 24.—Special despatches from Constantinople this morning describing the encounter with the advancing constitutional army and with the troops of the Constantinople garrison say that both sides used artillery and machine guns and that the combatants gradually swarmed into the town, fighting in the streets. The loyalists sought shelter in the French hospital after having been pursued by the constitutionalists whose superior discipline and training was clearly evident. Two onlookers were killed during the struggle.

THE BATTLE OVER. Constantinople, April 24.—Complete tranquility was restored in Constantinople by noon when the last refractory surrendered and the firing ceased. Several of the isolated guard houses defended themselves bravely against the Salonikians. These fights in the centre of the city resulted in a considerable loss of life.

On the Tache Kischela barracks the Sultan's men were returning the rifle fire presently. Presently the loyal troops occupied the military school nearby and fired on the advancing Yildiz. A considerable reinforcement from the Yildiz barracks joined the soldiers at Tache Kischela, where the Salonika chassiers, accused of betraying the constitutionalists, defended themselves.

During the encounter a rain of bullets fell among some persons observing the great panorama in the Grande Rue de Pasa. With this warning of danger, the correspondents and others hastily withdrew.
