as well as providing a beautiful entrance to the City. Your Committee therefore recommend that the City Engineer be and is hereby authorized to consult with the Provincial Highways Department re plans and cost of such a project, to report back to this Committee as soon as possible.  
Your Committee further recommend that the work of grading the New Athletic Grounds of Thomas Street be proceeded with to the extent of \$500 as provided in the estimates, and that the offer of the McKinnon Industries to give financial assistance to secure the early use of a football ground here be accepted.  
Your Committee are desirous of levelling off a football diamond on the new site with as little expense as possible, but having regard to the increasing demands from Athletic organizations for more accommodation for games.  
Some Communications.  
A letter was received from Secretary Robertson of the Fire Underwriters' Ass'n. asking to be informed

as to the exact situation in relation to the local fire brigade.

It was announced that the St. Catharines sitting of the Deep Waterways and Power Ass'n. will be June 25th.

The resolution of the Trade and Labor mass meeting relating to the firemen was received and ordered filed.

The G. W. V. A. asked that Thomas Can be appointed a member of the Housing Commission.

#### MOTHERS PRAY THAT BABIES MIGHT DIE

Suffering Among Jews is So Bad That Death Alone Gives Relief.

Mothers begging for death to relieve their children's suffering, was the most tragic thing seen by Leo Wolfson, New York attorney and journalist, in seven weeks spent in Roumania, Galicia, Bessarabia and Bukovina. Mr. Wolfson, who has just returned to New York, made the trip in order to study political conditions in these countries.

"There are one and one-half million Jews in this section of Eastern Europe who are in immediate want," declared Mr. Wolfson. "In every town I visited, I saw starving, naked Jews stretching out their hands to passers-by for a piece of bread. They hardly look like human beings. All one sees are living skeletons, covered with yellow skin. The children are small, worn-out, frightened, little creatures, who just drag themselves aimlessly around."

"How they will live through the winter, no one knows. No one can begin to describe this picture of misery and want. But one can get an idea of it, knowing that mothers are actually praying that death take their children, to relieve their terrible suffering."

#### Battle of Fire Hall Refought Last Night

which threatened the life of the fragile board.  
Mayor Lovelace said the report was scarcely in accordance with the facts. He said they were not fair. He hadn't been notified of these innumerable meetings held by the Fire and Light Committee.

Ald. Dakers strongly scored the Mayor. He said if the Mayor hadn't been notified he was not in ignorance of what was going on. Furthermore the Mayor whose business it was to be at the Fire Hall to see the city's interests were being protected, was never there all through the crisis.

Ald. Dakers also took the Mayor to task for things he said at the King George meeting.

The Mayor denied saying certain things whereupon Ald. Dakers produced a verbatim report of his speech taken in short hand.

One thing that had been said was that the Council had set itself to beat the firemen.

"Those are statements made absolutely without foundation," said Ald. Dakers. "The council didn't need to beat the firemen. They beat themselves by walking out."

The Mayor retorted that he had called in at the Fire Hall every day to ask the chief how he was getting on. He didn't recollect seeing Ald. Dakers there.

Ald. Rifler was quick to come to Ald. Dakers support. He and Ald. Dakers had manned the Lake Street Fire Hall all night.

Ald. Rose said during the crisis it was impossible to give members of the Fire and Light Committee formal notice. There were times it was necessary to get the members together in a hurry.

Ald. Rose criticized Ald. Avery for remarks he made with reference to the work of his successor. He felt certain that if any other member of the council had been chairman from the first of the year, the trouble would not have occurred. Ald. Rose said he himself had never claimed to be a friend of labor any more than any other class. He submitted that there was only one real labor representative in the council and he was a good one. "You can pick him out for yourselves," said Ald. Rose.

Ald. Rose referred to the fact that the G.W.V.A. had not supplied any firemen though they now had a number of returned men.

Ald. Avery Replies  
Ald. Avery in his defence referred to Fire Chief Early's statement that the brigade was 100 per cent. efficient. He told the chief they could stand for no insubordination and one man who had offended was at once dismissed as was right.

He knew nothing of the trouble impending and knew nothing of the Montreal man coming.

He considered that the firemen had been used unjustly because they were to get an increase of 25 per cent.

As for being a labor representative he was certain that he had interested himself in labor all his life, being early in life connected with the Woodworkers' union. In conclusion he considered that Ald. Rose had shown no FOUGHT BATTLE GAL, THREE disposition to treat with the firemen.

Ald. Graves said the Council wished to act fairly with the firemen. Had the statements not been published in

### Income Tax Return on or before the 30th of April, 1920.



ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

#### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-fives per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

#### General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepare postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

## Another Say Amendme The Li

TORONTO, April 22.—For five hours yesterday, the members of the Ontario Legislature engaged in a "free-for-all" on the McCreary resolution asking the Dominion Government to take a referendum on the prohibition of liquor importation. When the House adjourned late last night, two amendments were in the Speaker's hands, but a division seemed still far away. The first day of debate showed the balance of sentiment in favor of the resolution, while the Government has reason for believing that the resolution will carry, it was evident last night that the opposition to the proposal will be extensive enough to jeopardize the success of the referendum which is submitted to the people. T. division in the temperance force was strongly reflected in the debate in the House, and with one or two exceptions, the opposition to the solution as it stands was based upon the probability that a referendum would be held does not apply to Ontario and that any attempt to apply it would be upset in the courts.

Liberal Amend<sup>ment</sup>  
This view found expression in a Liberal amendment introduced by L. Mackin, of West Kent, which was seconded by Karl Hornuth, the St. Waterloo Labor member. The amendment is not a bar to a referendum but demands that before the referendum is submitted, the province submit a stated case to the courts.

## WELL STOCKED CELLAR DRAWS BOOZE THIEVE

BRIDGEBURG, April 19.—Two robbers have been active along lake shore as revealed by complaint made to Chief Edwards of the Ontario police at Port Erie.

Buffalonians owning summer cottages along the lake shore have tendered complaint to the effect that cellars, in many cases filled with Canadian whiskies and ales, have been entered by an organized gang and much of the contents taken. One case complaint is made thirty quart bottles were stolen.

Three men have been arrested in connection with the charges and general investigation is being conducted into the affair.
