The snow, rain and wind storm that prevailed in the Sierra Nevada foothills, California, during Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday was most fatal to sheep. The road from Sonora up to Strawberry Station, a distance of thirty-two miles, is lined with dead sheep. In the ravines and beside the boulders along the roads the animals are piled two and three deep. Up this date some fourteen thousand sheep have perished in this section.

Bishop Hawkins, the head of the British Methodist Episcopal church in Canada, residing at Chatham, Ontario, attained the eighty-sixth anniversary of his birthday Monday. 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
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
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
