The Eagle Arrives

HAS 5,000 OLD AND 1,700 YOUNG SEALS—THE WEIGHT OF 17,000.

The s.s. Eagle, Capt. Jos. Kean, arrived here at 10 a.m. to-day from the sealfishery and hauls for 5,000 old harps and 1,700 young harps; or in other words the ship has doubled the catch for which she was last reported. The Eagle, though a powerful ship, had hard lines during the spring, and when she reached the vicinity of the main patch on the 18th in company with the Aurora, the big ships of the fleet had it all cut up and she only secured a few hundred between that time and the 25th of March, when she steamed north in search of the old fat. She forced down to the neighbourhood of the Round Hill Islands on the Labrador coast, and during the "pre-drift" weeks found old seals plentiful; but the ice was loose, bad weather prevailed and it was impossible to hunt them with any degree of success. She however did well and picked up over 3,000, most of these being shot by the gunners on board. The weather was cold and stormy during the voyage, and the crew were all well except one man, who is in a bad condition.

Bravery of Little Tot.

Saturday, Patrick Hayse, the 3 years old son of Mr. John Hayse, of the King's Bridge, left his home and going through the garden, walked down by the side of the river which had been swollen from melting snow and is very deep. He stumbled and fell in and was in danger of drowning when his little brother, Patrick, aged 5, espied him and rushing into the swollen river grasped his brother and held him above the water. He then screamed to the top of his voice for some time until his cries, eventually, reached his mother, who fearing an accident rushed from the house and promptly went to the rescue. Had the little chap left his brother to go and seek help, the latter would have drowned. Both children were drenched and chilled from their immersion in the cold water.

Declared 8 Per Cent.

The 67th annual meeting of the shareholders of the St. John's Gas Company, held to-day at their room Board of Trade Building, Mr. Jas. B. Slater occupied the chair in the absence of Hon. Jas. Atlanta Towed Here.

CRASHED INTO ICEBERG—LEAKING BADLY—CARGO JETTISONED.

The schooner Atlanta, Capt. Noah Jones, arrived here Saturday at 2 p.m., having been towed into port by the S. S. Beothic which picked her up in Baccalieu Tickle.

The vessel which is owned by H. J. Earle, of Fogo, left here at 3 p.m. Friday for that place laden with a full cargo of supplies including molasses, etc., and had a fair run to Baccalieu Tickle when about midnight a large iceberg believed to be at least 400 feet in length and towering very high above the water loomed up before the crew and right in the track of the vessel. Before an effort could be made to wear the vessel and avoid the crystal mass she went full tilt against it striking bow on, and the impact was terrific the schooner being badly damaged as a result. The bowsprit was carried away, the bows beaten in, cut water smashed and the beams opened about six inches from the bows to the amidship section of the vessel, while all the head gear was cut away, and the crew feared for a while that she would fill and sink under them. So heavily did she hit the ice that the anchor, which weighs 6 cwt., was bent and twisted as if it was so much wire. By great exertion the vessel was worked out from under the berg, and as she swung around she again came into contact with it and the boat in the davits aft was smashed in pieces, planks and heavy beams and stanchions smashed and broken off like matchwood, the upper tube of one of the pumps was broken and general havoc created on board. Shortly after the collision the men found the water up to the cabin and forecastle floors, the pumps were kept going but could not keep her free and it was seen if she was not to go down under them there was nothing for the crew to do but to lighten her forward where most of the damage was and where the water entered, by jettisoning the cargo. Fully \$2,000 worth of goods were thrown overboard including several packages of molasses, the heads of which were beaten in and the contents allowed to run away. The keeper of the light house on Baccalieu heard the commotion on the vessel came on board and rendered valuable assistance, and after daylight Saturday a boat from Bay de Verde reached the

vessel, and returning wired here for assistance and the John Green was dispatched to the rescue. The Beothic returning after landing sealing crews at different places north, met the damaged vessel and took her in tow, arriving here safely with her. The pumps were kept going on the vessel continually, the crew taking turns in "watches" at them, and immediately after arrival here to further lighten her the vessel the rest of the cargo was transferred to two other schooners laying in the stream. The freight on board which consisted in a great measure of flour, butter, dry goods, etc., is value for about \$10,000, and a great deal of it has been damaged by water. But that the vessel was such a staunch one she must have foundered.
