OBITUARY.

JAMES P. BRADBURY.

Mr. James P. Bradbury, a well-known citizen, died last night at 8.30, after a long illness; he had attained his 75th year. He was born in Harbor Grace, and sailed in the S. S. Panther and S. S. Iceland for 35 years. He went to the scullery when only 12 years of age and followed up the avocation for sixty odd successive springs; most of this time he was chief engineer. He had an operation performed at Battle Harbor 2 years ago, and had been ailing ever since. He was obliged to stay at home since last January when he spent most of the time in bed suffering a good deal from his ailment till the time of his death. He leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters to mourn their loss. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon.

How Consumers Waste Gas.

1. By using heavy iron utensils suitable for contact with flame and smoke, instead of those made of lighter metal, through which the heat can more easily penetrate.
2. By neglecting to turn off the gas-burners the instant the cooking is done, or to lower them when it is possible to reduce the heat.
3. By want of method and forethought in managing the cooking—i.e., instead of steaming potatoes over the saucerpan in which a pudding is being boiled, a careless cook will boil both, thus using two gas burners instead of one.
4. By using soot-coated utensils; soot being a non-conductor of the heat, the consumption of gas will be increased. Also an unpleasant smell will be caused.
