Ministers and Investors.

We observe that Sir Edward Morris is giving a number of interviews to certain papers. We have before us interviews published in The Standard of Empire, The Financial News, The Financial World, and Canada. In a report of an interview published in "Canada" there is one paragraph which has a direct bearing on the principle that a Minister of the Crown should not be a party to transactions which are set forth in the two Memorials which were laid before His Excellency the Governor, over two months ago.

The paragraph to which we refer is as follows, and the part to which we especially direct attention is printed in block type.

"The pity is that English investors desiring to invest in Canada and Newfoundland do not, before making their investments, first satisfy themselves from reliable sources as to the bona-fides of the representations made to them. If they did there would be less disappointment as to the results of many of the investments which from time to time are made. Speaking for Newfoundland, I can say that if any person requires information in relation to the resources of the country or the opportunities for investment, or indeed, in relation to any matter, this can always be obtained from official sources by applying direct to the Colonial Secretary or to the chief of any other Department at St. John's."

It will be observed that Sir Edward advises intending investors in propositions in Newfoundland to apply to the Colonial Secretary or to the chief of any other Department at St. John's, in order to obtain information. As Nfld. Ministers holding portfolios

have been publicly recommended by the Prime Minister of Newfoundland for this purpose, it is now, more than ever, absolutely essential that their position shall be absolutely above suspicion of any personal interest in any investment scheme. It is a sine qua non that each Minister shall be able to make a declaration fully and truly that he has no interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any investment scheme of the nature referred to by Sir Edward Morris. The Premier on February 22nd last declared in the House of Assembly, as we have quoted on several occasions:—

"I have never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any timber or mineral wealth. I have never made an application for a piece of timber or a mineral grant."

As a declaration of strict adherence to a rule of conduct which should guide a Minister of the Crown, the sentiment expressed is admirable. Indeed if any other rule was permissible, or if strict adherence to such a rule was not insisted on, the existence of a Ministry would be a menace to the commonwealth and would go far to discredit our system of government and tend to convert party government into a system of graft.

Much more is such a rule of conduct essential now that the Prime Minister of Newfoundland has advertised his Ministers as chiefs of bureaux of official, and therefore disinterested, information for intending investors in the resources of Newfoundland.

In order that there may be plain dealing and that Newfoundland be raised above reproach, and recover from the severe blows Newfoundland schemes have received the last three years, it is essential that this plain duty be observed by every Minister of the Crown.

His Excellency the Governor is the guardian of our honour in this respect, and the Prime Minister is his chief adviser in respect of it. How then does it happen that Sir Edward has not insisted on the resignation of the Hon. Donald Morrison, and how comes it about that the latter is acting as Premier, for in the Daily News of yesterday is published a message addressed to "HON. D. MORRISON, ACTING PREMIER?"

It seems opportune now to direct the attention of His Excellency the Governor to this new departure of his Prime Minister, and to ask him to take it into consideration in arriving at a decision on the Memorials submitted to him by the President of the P. F. I. And also, as His Excellency is apparently waiting for the return of his Prime Minister for further discussion before he gives his decision, we direct his attention to a document which was filed in the office of the Registrar of Companies, St. John's, Newfoundland, on March 2nd, 1911, a copy of which certified by the Registrar is now before us as we are writing. It relates to the St. George's Lumber Co., and acts forth that at that time the nominal capital was \$1,200,000, divided into 1,200,000 shares of \$1 each. The total number of shares recorded as issued for cash was 15,000. The total amount agreed to be considered as paid on 1,165,000 shares was \$1,165,000.

These latter shares are recorded as issued for other considerations than cash. The feature of the document to which we direct special attention is the share list, which sets forth that Sir E. P. Morris, of St. John's, Nfld., held on February 20th, 1911, 40,000 shares in this company.

This latter statement is apparently in direct conflict with Sir Edward's statement in the House of Assembly last February, viz.:—
"I have never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote in any timber or mineral wealth."

His Excellency the Governor will doubtless consider the propriety of requesting his Chief Minister, who is we imagine advising him on the Memorials, to reconcile his statement taken from the official debates of the House of Assembly with the statement in the record of the Registry of Companies to which we have referred, and particularly so, now that the Prime Minister has recommended Newfoundland Ministers as advisers to British and other investors.

Men's Narrow Escape.

Two who could swim reached the shore while the other two clung to the boat. After resting themselves the two swimmers procured a piece of rope and swam back to the boat and fastening it to her towed her to the shore, the others clinging onto the canvas for dear life. All four received a fright they will not forget in a hurry.

Norwegian Ship a Total Wreck.

CREW SAFE.

Yesterday the Telegram made an allusion to a Norwegian vessel being ashore but at the time no particulars could be ascertained. To-day we were kindly furnished with details by Mr. J. C. Hepburn, who was apprised by a message from Balne Johnston's agent at Battle Harbour, Mr. Croucher stating that the "Thattalla," a full rigged Norwegian ship, went ashore at Pleasure Harbor, which is about twenty miles from Battle Harbor, on Monday. The Thattalla is a barge of 1,700 tons and was in ballast on her way from Sandfjord, Norway, to Pt. Leamington, for a cargo of lumber when she went ashore. On receipt of the above information Mr. Hepburn communicated with their agent, Mr. Croucher, giving instructions for the S. S. Southern Cross, which was at Battle Harbor with supplies, to proceed to the wreck and give all assistance possible. The Southern Cross reached the scene of the wreck yesterday at noon and returned to Battle Harbor this morning reporting to headquarters here that the Thattalla was a total wreck. Nothing definite as to the cause of the happening could be learned. The crew of the ill-fated ship reached the shore safely in boats.

No later particulars were to hand up to press hour and it is unknown whether the loss is covered by insurance.
