

Earl of Derby Will Not Sell.

London, February 9.-The Earl of Derby has declined to sell to Baron de Forest his Bootle estate in the suburbs of Liverpool, as at one time appeared likely, on the ground that the Baron had wilfully misrepresented the terms of his offer.

Recently in a contribution to the Lands Inquiry Committee's report, Baron de Forest cited the Bootle es tate of the Earl of Derby as a striking example of unearned increment. The property, which was purchased in 1724 for \$35,000, he estimated to be now valued at between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000

Lord Derby declared that the estiates were grossly excessive and said would sell the Bootle estate to on de Forest for \$7,500,000.
