Methodist Conference.

THURSDAY, June 24.

Afternoon Session, was taken up with routine work and committees. Evening Session.—Conference assembled at 8 p.m. to consider the question of Young People's Societies. This is a most important and vital question and merits the fullest consideration of the church of to-day. After the usual devotional exercise the order of the day was called for. Dr. Curtis Spoke Concerning the Methodist Day Schools.

Dr. Curtis said the Conference had shown its deep interest in our educational work by placing its discussion early in the programme of the Conference. Much criticism has been heaped upon the denominational school system, but it has not suffered so much caustic criticism as the system of some other countries. The number of Methodist schools last year was 364 with an attendance of 15,738. The Church's responsibility in this connection is great. To educate these children in sound moral principles as well as giving them intellectual training should be her duty, for education includes physical, intellectual, moral and spiritual instruction. The women here has a wide open door for the moulding of the future life and thought of the day. The generation of to-morrow in the schools of to-day. But at present time the work is chiefly intellectual training and in this respect the Methodist Church is accomplishing good results, 28 per cent of the children of the Island belong to the Methodist Church. With this percentage we secured 44.25 per cent of the total passes in the Council of Higher Education examinations; out of nine 1100 scholarships six fell to the Methodist Schools. The Superintendent suggested several improvements: (1) Better training for the teachers, an undenominational normal school; (2) Better equipment for the schools; (3) More interest taken in the schools on the part of the Boards.

After the presenting of the above report a general discussion followed. The report was then adopted and a motion expressing appreciation of the work of Dr. Curtis was put and unanimously carried.

The Report of the Sunday Schools was then read by Rev. C. A. White, M.A., B.D. The various items of the report were dealt with separately and following recommendations:

(1) That in view of the coming plebiscite systematic temperance instruction be given in our schools; (2) That the five catechism be taught in all the schools; (3) That Sunday School Institutes be held in all the Districts.

Completion of this report the Benediction was given by Rev. W. Swann.

The Unlicensed Motor Drivers.

According to the Inspector General, who made the statement in court yesterday, there are some sixty persons driving motor vehicles in the city without licenses to do so. The police are now after the delinquents. A dozen summonses are being issued for about a dozen parties who will be brought to task on Monday next. A named Leonard Reid was summoned to court on Wednesday on two charges—for driving without a license and also running a motor car at 10.30 p.m. without lights. He pleaded guilty to both offences committed. In view of work done by him, the police asked that no fine be imposed and the accused was dismissed, with no black mark against him. Yesterday, Mr. Uronhart was up for driving without a necessary permit. He acknowledged his guilt and also offered the excuse that he was doing work for the Empire with his motor. In this case the defendant was fined \$10.00 or 30 days and costs.
