### Fishery Report.

The following report of the fishery is now posted at the Board of Trade Rooms:

Aug. 7th. From W. Ward, (Mosquito Pt. to Bryant's Cove).—The total catch is 4021 qtls. and for last week 268. Twenty-six boats and 15 dories, skiffs and boats are fishing. Prospects are not very good and practically nothing was done this week with hook and line or traps, most of the latter having been more or less damaged.

Aug. 7th. From W. Chambers (Hr. Buft to Brine's Island).—There is not much doing with codfish and bait is scarce though there is a showing of squid. Dogfish are numerous and operations have been hindered by stormy weather. The catch to date is 2400 qtls with 200 for last week. All the traps have been taken up but 20 dories and skiffs and 17 boats are still fishing.

Aug. 7th. From Jas. White, Colinet Island (Head of Salmonier).—All the traps have been taken up, but 60 dories and skiffs and 20 boats are fishing. The total catch is 4000 qtls., but practically nothing was done last week. Prospects are much better since last report and some squid and caplin is obtainable for bait. None of the fishermen have returned this week but reports from the outside say prospects are much improved.
