## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

#### CARGO DESTROYED BY FIRE.

BALTIMORE, March 2. Several thousand tons of cotton consigned to Liverpool were destroyed to-night by fire in the hold of the British steamer Carolinian, of the Garland Line. The vessel was about finished loading and would have cleared to-morrow morning. Included in the cargo was a large and varied supply of merchandise assigned to the Allies. The capacity of the vessel is 7,000 tons. The origin of the fire is not yet determined.

#### CHARGED WITH COMPLICITY.

HAVANA, March 2. Pablo Dreher, a German, and friend of Miguel Gomez, rebel leader, was arrested here to-day charged with complicity in a plot to overthrow the government. Leaders of the revolt apparently facing defeat to-day offered to lay down arms and the guarantee of retirement of all military chiefs of the revolutionists, if President Menocal would preserve independence and liberty and prevent American interference in Cuban affairs.

#### NAVAL BILL ADOPTED.

WASHINGTON, March 2. By a vote of 62 to 26 the Senate to-day adopted the committee amendment naval bill, authorizing the establishment of a second navy yard on San Francisco Bay, with the initial appropriation of \$1,500,000 to acquire a site.

#### MEXICO PRO-ALLY IN ITS SYMPATHIES.

EL PASO, March 2. Mexico is pro-ally in its sympathies and any effort to spread German propaganda there would meet with little encouragement among Mexican people, Audres Garcia, Inspector General of the Mexican Consulates said to-night upon his return from Mexico City where he was in conference with General Carranza. If there are any Germans or Mexicans with German sympathies trying to influence public opinion in Mexico through official or semi-official positions, they will be discharged as soon as discovered, I am sure, said Garcia.

#### TIME FOR VOTE NOT SETTLED.

WASHINGTON, March 2. Early this morning, after more than eight hours' debate on the Armed Neutrality Bill, in the Senate, the leaders reported an agreement for recess until 10 a.m., without settling a time for a vote on the measure.

#### SMUTTS A PRIVY COUNCILLOR.

LONDON, March 2. Lieut.-General Jan Christian Smutts former Commander of the British forces in German East Africa, and member of the South African Cabinet, has been made a Privy Councillor.

#### HOLLAND'S BREAD.

LONDON, March 2. A despatch to the Central News from Amsterdam, says that as a consequence of the sinking of Dutch ships by German submarines, orders have been issued that bread shall be baked in Holland from potato flour.

#### NOTHING IN IT.

LONDON, March 2. A despatch to the Daily Mail from the Hague says: Germany's suggestion to lend Holland ships to replace those sunk, has apparently been withdrawn, probably because it is realized the ships would be credited by the Entente as German and seized. It is understood Holland requested compensation for the loss of the vessels sunk, or their replacement.

#### U. S. GETTING BUSY!

WASHINGTON, March 2. The passing of the first shock of yesterday's disclosures that Germany had plotted to incite Mexico and Japan to war against the United States, found government agencies to-day more closely united in spirit against the threatened danger and waiting with keen interest official statements from Mexico and Japan defining their attitudes. Officials confidently looked for expressions of friendship from both, and the consequent collapse of the German intrigue, nevertheless preparations were hurried along for whatever may confront the nation. The bill authorizing President Wilson to arm ships and providing a bond issue of \$100,000,000 was in the Senate's hands, and action was expected late to-day or to-night.

#### NO SPECIAL WARNING WILL BE GIVEN.

BERLIN, March 2. The Admiralty made the following announcement to-day: On March 1st expired the final period of grace allotted for sailing ships in the Atlantic. From this date no special warning will be given to any boats by submarines.
