### Handel's "Messiah."

On Wednesday, March 23, 1919, Handel's greatest oratorio, the "Messiah," was, for the first time, performed in England, at Covent Garden Theatre, in London. Born at Halle, in Saxony, on February 23, 1685, George Frederick Handel lived in Italy from 1706, but in 1710 came to England, where he found his work more welcome. He died in London on April 14, 1759, and was buried in Westminster Abbey. It occupied him 33 days to compile his oratorio, and it was first performed on April 13, 1742, at Dublin, when the receipts were given to the charities of that city. His first commemoration was held at Westminster Abbey on May 28, 1743, when King George III., his wife Queen Charlotte, and about 3,000 persons were present. The band included 245 instrumental performers; and the receipts of three days amounted to £17,746. The centenary of his death was celebrated by a great Handel Festival in the Crystal Palace, Sydenham, in June, 1857, with 2,765 vocalists, and 393 musicians; receipts reaching about £33,000, which £15,000 were profits. Handel Festivals have been held frequently since.

### Smallpox.

Dr. Gill, of Brigus, wired to the Board of Health yesterday that two cases of smallpox had appeared in Cupids, one at Brigus Junction, and also one case of influenza at the latter place.  
Dr. C. J. McDonald has returned to the city. He reports several cases of smallpox at Haystack, and Woody Island, P.E. While away he vaccinated over 100 people.


