## Extra Troops for Ireland.

### 2,000 Reinforcements Have Landed -- Government Will Send Others as Required -- London-derry Riots Continue Unabated -- General Approval of Anglo-French Premiers Conference -- Carranza Eludes Pursuers.

**TROOPS LANDED IN IRELAND.**

CORK, May 17. Two thousand troops from England were landed at Bantry on Saturday and immediately distributed throughout West Cork, where they will be stationed at points five miles apart. Troops to the number of 150 also arrived at Skibbernet. They commandeered several buildings there, including the town hall, which was made their headquarters. Thomas Johnson, acting secretary of the grades congress, at a labor meeting in the city hall yesterday, said the workers of Ireland had no intention of establishing such a republic as that in America, where the very idea in personal liberty was unknown, he said, and where men and women were sentenced to long terms of imprisonment for daring to strike.

**SEND ALL TROOPS NEEDED.**

LONDON, May 17. Questioned in the House of Commons today on the number of troops being sent to Ireland, Bonar Law, the government leader, replied: "I have no information to give on the subject, but we are sending and shall send whatever troops are asked for by the Irish executive."

**FURTHER SHOOTING IN LONDON-DERRY.**

LONDON-DERRY, Ireland, May 17. Rioting last night between Nationalists and Unionist mobs was even fiercer than Saturday's fighting. Bottles, bricks and pistols were again freely employed by the combatants and many shop windows were broken. Groups of men and women in the Unionist quarter of Fountain Street and similar groups in the Sinn Fein quarter of Bridge Street followed an exchange of party cries with stones and bottle throwing. Then more than a hundred revolver shots followed. In addition to the killing of a former soldier named Doherty, three others were wounded. When hostilities broke out the police in the disturbed area were withdrawn and for a few hours mob law was supreme.

**BOLSHREVKI STRIKING BACK.**

LONDON, May 17. Russian Bolshevik forces are striking back at the Poles and Ukrainians who captured Kiev about ten days ago, according to an official statement issued in Moscow yesterday and received here by wireless. The statement said the Soviet troops had started an advance and were about ten miles northeast of Kiev.

**ROBERT TEMPLETON.**

**Cup Challenger Has An English Crew.**

London, May 13.—(By Canadian Press.)—Although Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America's Cup, is an Irish yacht, the challenge being sent by the Royal Ulster Club of Belfast, she will have an entire English crew. She also was built in England.

Capt. Albert Turner, her professional skipper, and all but two of her crew are from Essex. The two exceptions are from Cornwall. The average age of the men is 35 years.

Three were in the crew of Shamrock III, when she raced in the United States seventeen years ago. They are Edward Herd, mate; William Clark, chief cook, and Arthur Bernet, seaman.

All the men were in the war. Several who went to the United States on the challenger in 1914 hurried back home when the war started. Most of them were on patrol vessels. A few planted mines.

Shamrock IV, is Capt. Turner's largest racing yacht. He has been racing thirty years, however, one of the craft he handled being the 19-metre Octavia. He has had 15-metre craft, 20-tonners and half raters.

**ITALY'S FINANCIAL TROUBLES.**

ROME, May 17. Signor Bonomi, Minister of War in the retiring cabinet, has abandoned his attempt to form a ministry because the popular party in parliament has declined to participate. King Victor Emmanuel has again consulted former Premier Nitti, and as a result has summoned Signor De Nava, Minister of Public Works and Transport in the Nitti government.

**STRIKE ON, BUT PUBLIC SERVICES CONTINUE.**

PARIS, May 17. At yesterday's meeting of the administrative committee of the General Federation of Labor, the question of resuming work in all trades affected by strikes was debated, but no agreement could be reached, according to the newspapers. Another meeting will be held on Wednesday. In the meantime public services continue in spite of the strike.

**CALLING DENIELS' BLUFF.**

WASHINGTON, May 17. International interest will be revived this week in the Sims' denial controversy by evidence designed to show the amazing two-facedness of President Wilson's Naval Minister. In Washington Daniels' anathematized the admiral for succumbing to his British environments. In London Daniels "rejoiced that the war was represented in England by a courageous, wise and brave man, who understood the very heart of the struggle, and entered into it with sympathy and heartfelt feelings toward his British comrades."

The W.P.A. is making Child Welfare work its chief concern, and has a good many activities in connection with it to finance, all of which need money. The services of an expert social worker from England, Miss Haslem, have been secured, and will prove of great value to the whole Child Welfare Movement. The community nursing service is one of the good works the W.P.A. is pledged to assist. We all know the visiting nurses and we know what countless services they render daily to the mothers and babies of St. John's. The three community nurses here average almost 1400 visits a month and their help and advice are eagerly welcomed by the mothers of young children. So long as there are babies the city will need these community nurses. The two Milk Stations, The "Infant Welfare Centre," shortly to be launched, the "Little Hospital" on LeMarchant Road, for babies, just started, and which will probably be the means of saving many infant lives,—all these enterprises require funds to start and to keep them going, but they are all for the betterment of our coming citizens and your city. The people of St. John's must stand behind the workers in their vast field of labor, with encouragement and practical aid, for the value of their work to the community can scarcely be exaggerated.
