Collection. COLLECTORS MEET WITH MUCH

SUCCESS. The annual collection for the Christian Brothers, taken at the R.C. Churches of the Archdiocese yesterday fell short of last years amount by a little over \$107 but is is expected that as several sums from various sources are yet to come in, the collection will equal, if not exceed last year's total. The amount received this year is \$7.-985.14; and that of last year was \$8.-092.48. The following are the par-

\$7,985,14 \$8,092,48 The success of the collection at this particular time, when money is not too plentiful, is a splendid testimony to the work of the Brothers in the cause of education. Immediately after Last Mass the collectors assembled at Mt. St. Francis, where the Hon. J. D. Ryan, in passing over the collection taken at the Cathedral, made a short address in which he eulogized the work of the Brothers, since their advent to our shores, and their splendid self-sacrifice and untiring zeal in the education of our catholic youth. The amounds from St. Patrick's were presented by Mr. M. Bambrick, from St. Joseph's by Mr. R. Jardine, and the collection taken at Mt. Cashel was presented by Rev. Bro. Conway,, all of whom made short addresses.

Rev. Bro Ahearn, on behalf of the Brothers, thanked the collectors and the people for their whole-hearted generosity. The collection exceeded their most sanguine expectations, and was even a greater success than last year's, taking everything into consideration. The generosity of the Catholic people of St. John's was proverbial and it must only spur the Brothers on to greater effort if that were possible. Brother Ahearn, in concluson, read a letter from His Grace the Archbishop, in which he wished the collection every success, and expressing the best wishes of himself and the Priests of the Diocese. Congratulatory speeches were made by Judge Morris, W. J. Higgins, K.C., C. J. Cahill, and Dr. V.P. Burke. After the collection at St. Patrick's Church was taken up the collectors met and handed in the result of their effort. Rev. Bro. Eagan, on behalf of the Brothers, tendered sincere thanks to the collectors and the parishioners for the magnificent collection and availed of the opportunity to give expression to the pleasure he derived from witnessing such an assemblage of enthusiastic workers. Speeches were delivered by Messrs John Barron, George F. Power, Jas. Cooney, John J. Rossiter, W. J. Brown, B.A., L. J. O'Keefe, W. J. Ashley, Robert J. Power, M. Galgay, Thos. J. Dalton, Fred O'Brien, Jas. Jackman, Michael Healey, and Jos. Fitzgibbon. At present there are five hundred and fifty boys attending the Holy Cross Schools, presided over by eight Brothers of the Order.

Cargo Ship on Fire.

BLAZE DISCOVERED IN HOLD OF S.S. CANADIAN GUNNER. S.S. Canadian Gunner which arrived

in port on Friday with a general cargo was discovered to be on fire Saturday evening. The ship had hauled to the dock premises to land a rudder for S.S. Canadian Seigneur, when, at 4 p.m., smoke was noticed issuing from No. 2 hold, the bunker hatch and from the ventilators. The firemen were called to the scene, and in the meantime a stream was forced into the compartment where the blaze was supposed to be. After about two hours work it was decided to berth the ship at the Furness Withy pier, where the burning cargo could be discharged. After tying up to the Furness wharf, a large number of 'longshoremen were put to work removing cargo, and a couple of streams connected up from Water Street. The seat of fire appeared in the cross bunker, where there was some 60 tons of coal, and a large quantity of hay. In No. 2 hold besides a large quantity of flour and oats, there were several hundred bundles of hay. The 'longshoremen worked in relays removing the burning cargo, the work proceeding without interruption, although very difficult owing to the smoke and steam. Some of the burning bundles of hay were dumped overboard and a large quantity which was only damaged by water was landed and piled in the Furness yard. The firemen have a very diffcult task, as it is the desire of the managers of the ship that the hold be not flooded, in the hope of saving the cargo in the other parts of the ship. Inspector General Hutchings is directing the work, and yesterday made four or five visits to the scene. How the fire originated is not known as everything appeared all right when the ship arrived in port on Friday. It is thought that the blaze will be under control this evenng. The flour and oats in the compartments effected will be practically lestroyed and the loss will run into

many thousands of dollars.
