Municipal Council.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and all the Councillors were present. After the usual preliminaries, the following matters received attention:

Communications were tabled from the Colonial Secretary as follows:—

1.—That the arrangement made with the St. John's Gaslight Company, to supply them from the gas on gas, having expired, orders had been given to renew collection of same.

2.—That consideration will be given to the Council's request for compensation for iron railing and concrete base, which the city at considerable expense, placed around the Parade Grounds some years ago.

Complaints of Jas. D. Rendell, Queen's Road, and W. C. Major, Quidi Vidi Road, re surface drains in their respective localities, will be given attention by the Roads Department.

J. C. Pratt, on behalf of the Board of Governors, Methodist College, wrote re the necessity of having drainage conditions improved on Harvey Road, so as to prevent further damage being done to property in this locality. The matter will receive attention.

The Mtd. Brewery, Ltd., wrote with regard to the sewer, Belvedere St. The erection of a new storm sewer in this street will shortly be undertaken.

The matter of the "Blind Corner," junction of Mundy Pond and Le-Marchant Roads, was referred to and the settlement for land expropriated in order to eliminate same was left in the hands of the Deputy Mayor and City Clerk, who will interview Solicitor W. J. Browne in connection therewith.

A communication was read from the Trade Printers & Publishers, Ltd. King's Printers, stating they had in course of preparation a new City Directory. Such a Directory is at present badly needed, and the action of the publishers in undertaking to compile same meets with the approval of the Council as also the Newfoundland Board of Trade.

Permits were granted the following subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—P. Summers, (anthouse), Freshwater Road; P. J. Fortune, (extension), Military Road.

The Medical Officer of Health recommended that permission be given Mr. A. Pike to erect stable rear of No. 104 LeMarchant Road, conditional upon the building being provided with concrete floors, water and sewerage, sufficient means of ventilation and lighting. It was ordered that permit be issued.

The Medical Officer of Health reported 18 new cases of Scarlet Fever in the city during the past week. In hospital at present time there are 51 cases, and 31 under treatment at home; of Diphtheria, 9 cases in hospital and Typhoid 2. This matter was the subject of considerable discussion, and it was ordered that the Health Officer be communicated with and asked for a general report as to the likely cause of this outbreak.

The City Engineer called attention to the advisability of having the concrete conduit at Windsor Lake examined. It was ordered accordingly.

In the matter of a cabin's shelter at the East End Stand, no action was taken, but it was ordered that the stand be given a coating of chipped stone.

The City Clerk reported that during the past week a large number of summonses had been issued for City Taxes, and notice had been placed in the daily papers with reference to the Poll Tax; after the 15th inst. summonses will be taken out against all delinquents in this respect.

C. O'N. Conroy, on behalf of the residents of Bonaventure Avenue, thanked the Council for so readily acceding to their petition for a storm sewer to be placed in this street. He stated that such an installation will to a great extent prevent recurrence of the inconvenience and damage to property suffered by the residents in past years through improper drainage.

The City Engineer reported that the work of removing the old stone storm sewer, Duckworth Street, and replacing same with 15" e.w. pipe had been completed; also the work of removing the old stone sewer, Waldegrave St. has been commenced. It is hoped the removal of this sewer will eliminate the damage to property of residents, of which so many complaints have been received for many years past.

The reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor and other departmental heads were tabled, and accounts presented were ordered paid. The meeting then adjourned.

BOWRING PARK.

During the week the Bowring Park Committee, consisting of Hon. Sir E. R. Bowring, Messrs. L. C. O'Brien, and D. M. Baird, Mayor Cook and Councillors Dowling, Collier and Ryan, held their first meeting in the Council Chambers. Many matters in connection with the improvement and management of the park were discussed. It is the intention of the Committee to do all possible to make this, our one and only rural park, in keeping with those of other cities.

Following the meeting a visit was made to the Park. It was pointed out that the road opposite the entrance is very narrow and a great danger to both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. It was unanimously decided that the Government be approached with a view to obtaining a portion of the land immediately opposite, so as to widen what is now looked upon as a most important thoroughfare.

Hospital "Miracle"

DEAD CHILD BROUGHT BACK TO LIFE.

Breathing Resumed After Lapse of 75 Minutes.

Having died whilst an operation was being performed upon her, Violet Winifred Leonard, a nine-year-old girl, was restored to life in remarkable fashion at St. George's Hospital, Westminster. Unfortunately, however, her "second" life was of short duration, but this does not detract in any way a great achievement. Some astounding evidence was given at the inquest upon the girl, held by Mr. Justice Oddie at Westminster. Deceased lived at Lynton-road, Bermondsey. She had suffered from ear disease since 1921, and had undergone several operations at the Evelina Hospital. On Aug. 9 she was admitted to St. George's Hospital, and two days later a preliminary operation was successfully performed. On Sept. 14 a second operation was necessary to join a sound nerve to a paralysed one, and during this she died, her breathing and heart beats being stopped. Massage and other remedies were applied, and the heart began to beat again, and continued to do so for an hour and a quarter, when the girl began to breathe. At this time she had been taken back to the ward, but respiration ceased in a quarter of an hour. Dr. Braxton Hicks, pathologist at Westminster Hospital, explained that death was due to syncope occurring during an operation to a patient suffering from the status lymphaticus. The operation was a necessary one, the being properly performed, and the anesthetic was suitable. It was a remarkable case in many ways. The patient had been dead for some time, but her heart was set going again, both respiration and heart-beats being kept going. The coroner observed that the operation to join a sound nerve to a faulty one, in the hope of restoring the nerve supply to wasted muscles and to bring about restoration of the muscles of the face, was a very difficult and dangerous one. The child's heart stopped, the patient being, in fact, dead, but a "miracle" was performed. The abdomen was opened, the heart massaged by the hand, and the dead patient came to life again. The heart began to beat, first in a flutter, and then steadily for a long time. Respiration was re-established, so that the patient recovered, and for a time was carrying on her existence by herself. That was to say, she was breathing naturally, and her heart was beating regularly, clearly a case of bringing back to life a patient who was, in fact, dead. Had it not been for the condition of status lymphaticus the chances were that she might have recovered completely. A verdict of "death by misadventure" was returned.
