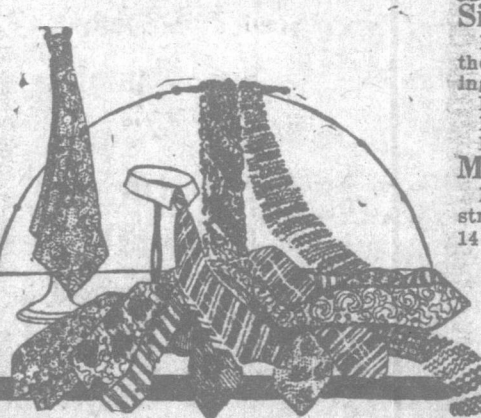

SEALING NEWS

The messages received from the sealing fleet on the Northern front last night state that all the ships are jammed and that the respective crews are experiencing no small difficulty in picking up their remaining seals. The heavy swell met with during the past few days has played havoc with the pans, many of which have drifted away with the fast running ice. The Viking reported this morning as having 700 whitecoats on board, with 200 on ice. Weather conditions in the Gulf are anything but favorable. The following messages have been received:

JOB BROTHERS & CO.

Neptune—(Thursday)—Wind N. E., weather thick, position 10 miles from Williamsport. One tow to-day. Pans distant; 10 or 12 pans in running ice. Expect to lose them.

Thetis—(Thursday evening)—Jammed all day, waiting for a change of wind to get clear. Lost 25 pans.

BOWLING BROTHERS.

Thursday Evening.

Eagle—Position same, ice tight, ship jammed. Men hauled 500. Wind north half easterly. Raining.

Ranger—Stowed 11,000; balance too far to haul. Ice tight. Ship jammed.

Sacoma—Same position; 2,000 still on ice; five miles away.

Terra Nova—Position unchanged; wind N. E. Ice tight, ship jammed.

Viking—Tight ice, ship jammed; weather thick and foggy. Present conditions greatly retard work. On board and stowed down 700; still on pans 200. Prospects fair.
