What is Disarmament?

"To find a technical basis for naval disarmament is comparatively simple. Within limits one battleship can be measured fairly accurately against another, and so with cruisers and destroyers and submarines. That was why the qualified success of the Washington Conference in 1921 was made possible at all," writes Mr. H. Wilson Harris in the Daily News.

"The problem of land armaments is about ten times as difficult. How are you to measure the effective value of a nation's fighting forces?" "By numbers? If so, it is to be the numbers of the actual standing army, or of the potential manpower of the whole nation?" "By guns? But the variety and range of modern artillery types is enormous." "By money? A given sum will purchase, so to speak, a far higher degree of efficiency in one country than in another."
