

Mr. Boutilier, he held in opposition to the views of the Hon. Mr. Cameron, that the Bills were still under the control of the House, and would be so until the Lieutenant-Governor sent a message to the House concerning them. He then quoted from the Confederation Act, from 1867, and others to point out that he considered the duty of the Ministers, and held they were bound constitutionally to advise the assent of the Lieutenant-Governor to the Bills. He went over the same source of argument as had been already stated in the debate just closed. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Merrick.

The Hon. Mr. Mowat, in reply to Mr. Cameron, said that he accepted the representation that he was trying to make friends with the different sections of religionists in the country. He certainly wished to stand well with all classes in the country, and he was proud to be able to secure the good opinion and good-will of all. The leader of the Opposition was unworthily raising the Protestant cry, and promoting strife for a paltry, temporary, political purpose. He (Mr. Mowat) was as good a Protestant as any in this House, and he was well known to be such all over the country, but yet he had no fear on account of Roman Catholicism in this Province. In vigorous terms he upheld the position taken by the Government as being constitutional duty, and they sent the Bills to the political Chief of the present Opposition, and he shirked his duty. Yet, with strange inconsistency the Opposition applauded the course adopted by their chief, and then they turn round, and blame us for doing a simple, constitutional duty.

The question of the amendment being in order was put by the Hon. Mr. Fraser, when the Speaker ruled it out of order. Mr. Boutilier was not satisfied, however, with the time already wasted on the debate, and moved another amendment with the same object in view as the previous ones but carefully worded so as to escape the ruling of the Speaker. It was seconded by Mr. Laurier.

Mr. Prince characterized the amendments of Mr. Cameron and Mr. Boutilier as absurdities and inconsistencies, for they declared in substance what had been already voted down. Messrs. Laurier, Fraser, M. C. Cameron, and Mowat spoken, the amendment was put and carried by a vote of 40 to 22.

The result was received with loud cheers. The Address was then adopted, and the formal motion in connection therewith passed.

Mr. Cameron inquired whether it was the intention of the Government to adjourn the House during the ensuing Dominion election.

Attorney General Mowat said the Government had not yet had the subject under consideration.

The House adjourned at 11.15.
