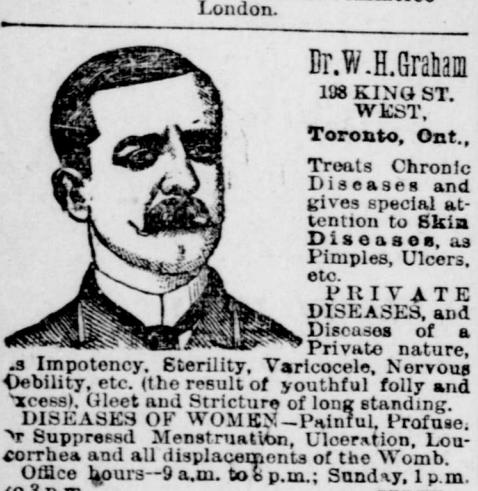

Chatham's Central School Will Cost
\$30,000.A Minister's Mishap—Going to the Holy
Land.

The new central school tenders at
Chatham have been let. The cost of
the work will be \$30,000.

Rev. J. W. Hoyt, pastor of the Bap-
tist Church, Dresden, has resigned,
to take effect on Sept. 13.

Rev. Mr. Picketing, Central Metho-
dist Church, Woodstock, will go on a
visit to the Holy Land.

The members of Mount Brydges
Oddfellows' Lodge, No. 217, are pre-
paring for a monster picnic in Squire
McGugan's grove, adjacent to that
village, on Tuesday.

The ten recent tests made in Both-
well oil fields all have been success-
ful. Two of them are over 200 bar-
rels. Never in the history of oil test-
ing in any part of America have such
results been obtained. The total yield
daily is nearly 1,000 barrels.

A Chatham dispatch says: It has
been found necessary to enclose Rev.
Dr. Battisby's body, from the arm-
pits to the waist, in plaster of paris. The
reverend gentleman's injuries from his
fall over the steep embankment were
much more serious than at first an-
ticipated, and recovery will be very
slow.

Windsor won its case against the
Windsor Gas Company for tearing up
the streets without a permit, and
for the removal of the gas mains. The
company's Manager J. T. Lynn and
Foreman John Hogan were each fined
\$20 and costs. The company is to be
allowed to go on laying its pipes until
its injunction expires next Tuesday.

Judge Bell, of Chatham, has given
his decision in the appeal against
the assessment of the court of re-
vision of that city. The most impor-
tant was that of the Chatham Gas
Company against an assessment of
\$30,000 on gas mains, \$4,000 on income
and \$20,000 on plant. His Honor
struck out the assessment on income,
but held that the assessment on
mains and plant was not excessive,
and therefore dismissed the appeal of
the company.

By a technicality in the law Henry
W. Delaney, accused of seduction,
and who has been in the Berlin jail
awaiting trial, so doubt escaped a
term in prison. The indictment rec-
ited that he, being over 21, had seduced
a female under age. The prisoner's
father proved, with the aid of the
family Bible, that his son was not
21 until last May, whereas the alleged
crime was committed during last De-
cember. As the crown had failed to
establish that the prisoner was over
21, Mr. Bowby agreed to have the
case dismissed.
