THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 17—11 p.m.—From the lakes east there has been little change in pressure since yesterday, but the depression over the Northwest States has developed considerably and an important area of high pressure has spread over the Canadian Northwest Territories, accompanied by cool weather and heavy local rains.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Medicine Hat, 56°—66°; Qu'Appelle, 50°—68°; Winnipeg, 52°—66°; Port Arthur, 60°—74°; Toronto, 57°—84°; Montreal, 66°—82°; Quebec, 64°—82°; Halifax, 60°—84°.

TORONTO, Aug. 18—1 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: South to south-west winds; very warm; but the depression over the Northwest States, becoming more general to-morrow.

—Capt. Foster's steamer carried quite a crowd down the river yesterday. Music was rendered at Wonderland and on the boat by a detachment of the Seventh Band.

—Mr. E. St. John, the Port Clinton, Ohio, capitalist, has handed the city a sealed document containing his proposition for the lease of the London and Port Stanley Railway.

—W. K. Evans and J. A. Tane, of this city, held official positions at the Sarnia bicycle races yesterday. The former was one of the judges and the latter one of the time-keepers.

—The annual camp of No. 1 Company, Seventh Foresters, came to an end this week, the men picking up tents and luggage and marching home from Springbank. All had a splendid time.

—Thos. A. Browne, secretary Western Fair Board, yesterday received an application for space from the McCormick Harvest Machine Company of Chicago. They will exhibit at the coming fair.

—The Canadian Order of Foresters held a large picnic at Port St. Lawrence, Ont., excursions being run from Toronto and other points. Mr. Edward Towe, of this city, high chief ranger, was among the speakers.

—Samuel Wesley Wilson, of St. Marys, and Miss Jennie Laing, of Dowrie township, Perth, were married by Rev. M. P. Talling at St. James' Church manse yesterday afternoon. The groom is a mason by trade. The couple left on a trip to western points.

—Dr. Stanley Tattersall has returned to his home, near London, Ont. He has been away from practice, with the object of devoting his time to the publication of his work on "Veterinary Surgery" which are to appear next fall. (Niagara Falls Record.)

—Walter Ireland, of Delaware township, will appear before Squire Smyth on Aug. 23 on a charge of assaulting and kicking a woman, and refusing to pay wages amounting to \$8 to Orland W. Adair, one of his employees. Adair's mother is the complainant.

—A number of musically-inclined campers serenaded Annie Pixley Tuesday evening under the concert in the town hall, Port Stanley. Their songs floated through the window of the actress' room, and the charming soprano acknowledged the compliment gracefully from the open casement.

—It is fair to George Stratford, of London West, remanded for assault and battery, way road, say that he denies the serious charge brought against him, and his friends believe that at the proper time it will be shown that this accused is mistaken in his man.

—Dr. W. H. Henderson, professor Queen's University, Kingston, died the other day in the presence of his relatives and friends, among whom were Mr. T. Alexander, collector of inland revenue, London, and Mr. Hendrie, Hamilton, and their wives, who were sisters of the deceased.

—Ex-Warden Gilmore, who has just returned from a drive through Delaware and Lobo, says he saw some very light yields and some pretty heavy ones also. He believes, however, that the harvest is poorer than last year. As to apples, the crop is extremely light. Hardly a farmer has an average yield.

—Thomas Davidson, of London West, has appealed from the decision of the Board of Health issued a short time ago, by which he was ordered to remove within a given time a cow house situated on his premises. The appeal came up before Judge Elliott, yesterday, and an adjournment was made until Saturday.

—The police have received a communication from Chief Williams, of London, stating that a warrant is out for the arrest of one Miss O'Brien on a charge of fraud. The sharper is described as small in stature, dressed in black, dark complexion, and will try to gain the confidence of Roman Catholics and convents, and will operate in missionary shops. (Woodstock Sentinel-Review.)

—Harry Christopher, in the employ of Tambling & Jones, contractors, while working yesterday on a scaffold at a two-story house on William street, stepped on a small piece of wood and fell to the ground, striking the kitchen roof and the fence in the descent. Some of the bricks of the house also gave way and came down on his shoulders. He was severely hurt and will be laid up for some time.

Accident to Mr. Wm. Fraser.

Last night about 9:30 Mr. Wm. Fraser, of the Fraser House, Port Stanley, had occasion to go to the attic or loft above the

dancing shed. The loft was dark, and not noticing an open door Mr. Fraser in stepping backward fell through the door to the ground, a distance of probably fifteen feet. He struck on the small of his back and was badly shaken up. Drs. Mothersill and Gustin do not think that any internal injuries were sustained, and it is hoped that in a few days Mr. Fraser will be around again. (St. Thomas Journal.)

Before the Police Magistrate.

Wm. Cushman was sentenced to two months in the Central Prison by the police magistrate this morning for the larceny of two rugs from Wm. Tripp and two from A. Duffon. A charge against Thos. Sargent of breach of the Liquor License Act was dismissed, and a similar case in which John Jacobs is the defendant was enlarged by consent for a week. William Kirk, son with trespassing on the G. T. R. property, was let go. Fred. Lawraon was charged with being drunk and disorderly on Dundas street one evening last week, and at his request the case was enlarged for a week. One drunk was discharged.

In Re Triplets.

A lady in Peel county who recently presented her liege lord with triplets has been awarded the Queen's bounty of £3. Some years ago application was made for the triplet bounty on behalf of a Canadian lady, the reply then given was that the subsidy was not available for cases occurring beyond the limits of the United Kingdom. The favorable consideration which the Peel county case has received marks an important change in Imperial policy. Henceforth enterprise will be rewarded, no matter in what part of the empire it displays itself. In Ontario as many as eight sets of triplets have been born in one year. There were quadruplets in this city in 1883, but three of the children died within a week.

A Distinguished Visitor.

Among the many distinguished visitors expected in Toronto next month at the meeting of the Pan Presbyterian Council none is more so than the Rev. J. J. Munro Gibson, D.D., moderator last year of the General Assembly of the English Presbyterian Church, and pastor of one of the largest churches in London, Eng., at St. John's Wood. He is at present at Chautauque, N. Y., and will be here on Saturday, the guest of his brother, Mr. L. Gibson, Talbot street, and will occupy the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church on Sunday. Those who will have the privilege of listening to him will enjoy the rare treat of hearing one of the foremost pulpits of the day. After leaving here the reverend doctor goes to Chicago, Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto.

Matrimonial.

In the Western Hotel parlors last evening at 8 o'clock Mr. Matthew James, brother of James James, the proprietor, was united in marriage to Miss Agnes May Reid, only daughter of J. J. Reid, of this city. After the knot had been securely fastened by Rev. G. Boyd the company, numbering about 50, sat down to a sumptuous wedding breakfast. A very pleasant time was spent until shortly after 11 o'clock, when Mr. and Mrs. James were escorted to the Grand Trunk station, where they took the 11:45 train for Montreal, New York and other eastern cities. Mr. James has been engaged on the Grand Trunk Railway for about 25 years, and is very popular among his fellow-employees. He is now a conductor. The newlyweds made up their residence in this city on their return from the honeymoon trip.

Mr. Baker's Death.

Referring to Mr. A. R. Baker, whose death occurred in this city on Tuesday, the St. Thomas Journal of Wednesday says: "Mr. Baker came to St. Thomas about three years ago as manager of the Bell Telephone Company's agency, and in the course of time became one of the best known young men in the city. He was of a kindly and social nature, and was an active member of the St. Thomas Whist Club, and of several athletic and social organizations. Only two months ago he was married to Helen, daughter of the late Jas. Oliver, of Port Stanley, and took up his residence at Port Stanley for the summer. To the bereaved young lady much sympathy will be extended. The deceased was a member of the Workmen of the World, in favor of which he had been insured for \$2,000, in favor of his mother. At the time of his marriage he made application to have the insurance raised to \$3,000 and changed to his wife. The policy has not yet been returned from Omaha. Mr. Baker was also a charter member of Rathbone Lodge, Knights of Pythias, in London, from which he received a lodge benefit of \$140. Departures from both lodges will attend the funeral to-morrow. The deceased is well known in Tilsonburg, where he spent his boyhood days. His father was at one time G. T. R. station agent there."

The Stolen Horse Recovered.

The Woodstock Sentinel-Review of yesterday contains the following: "James Williams was arrested by Sgt. Allen on a charge of horse stealing. The particulars of the case are as follows: On Tuesday week a gentleman engaged a horse by telephone at Sage's livery, London, and ordered it left at a certain point along the street. When the stable boy drove up with the horse the stranger made his appearance and paid a standing by to hold it for a few minutes. But in a few minutes three other men came out of the hotel and drove off in the rig. Mr. Sage lost all track of his horse for several days. Harry Gustin, liveryman here, saw a description of the animal and recognized it in the possession of Dan McLellan, blacksmith, who had got the horse in a trade with James Williams on Monday. Williams, who appears to be an itinerant horse jockey, was at once arrested and locked up. He got a preliminary trial this afternoon before Mayor Douglas." Mr. Sage visited Woodstock yesterday and found his horse, but no harness or buggy. It appears that a gentleman en route from Cleveland to London stopped off at Woodstock and told Mr. Gustin the particulars of the stealing. The officers who are engaged on the case expect to recover the buggy and harness, and also to arrest the man that stole the rig.

More than half of a home-keeping woman's time is spent in worrying, and a good share of the other half in preparing food. As though the stomach were the immortal part of us! Take one-quarter of the time a woman devotes to making pies, preparing puddings, putting up preserves, icing cakes and frying doughnuts, and let her devote it to rest and recreation, and she would not look like a shred of parchment paper at 40. It is the non-essentials that kill us. We must learn to simplify before we can escape the doom of premature age. Nature never intended us to live as we do. A dinner of 50 years ago was served in one course, and the mistress helped, both in the serving and removal.
