A Missionary Who Wants Hen, Nos Mency-Dr. Wild Likes London-\$1,460 Collection in Dundas Center Church-The Bishop of Huron Speaks Thrice.

"Men, not money" was the somewhat unusual plea of an elequent missionary Sunday at St. James' Church, South London, in the morning, and at St. Paul's Cathedral in the evening. Rev. R. W. Stewart was the preacher and China his field of labor. Only four missionaries among 1,000,000 heathen—a grand opportunity for spreading the Gospel among people willing to receive it—plenty of money if only men would dedicate themselves to Christ's service—such were his statements. Th. Protestant minority of the city of Dublin, he said, contributed more to missionary work than all Protestant Canada.
