FOOTBALL

LONDON 9, OTTAWA 7.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—The R. F. U. semi-final in the intermediate series between London and Ottawa II, played at Rosedale this afternoon, was won by the former by 9 to 7. The half-time score was 4 to 1. Thus the London team go into the final with Peterboro. The match was not a good one from a spectator's standpoint, as it was rough at times, Ottawa having three men ruled off and London two. Field and Switzer being off on two occasions for fouling.

London won the toss, and the ball was dribbled down the field towards Ottawa's line, where followed a number of scrummages. Bice, of London, breaking through the line, kicked over the line, the ball going to touch-in-goal. Score, 4 to 1.

The rest of the half was spent in scrummaging and punting.

On reversing ends, Ottawa kicked off, and for some time the play was at London's end. O'Garra, of Ottawa, got the ball and went over for a touch, and converted the try. Score, Ottawa 7, London 4.

For the next few minutes the play was at Ottawa's end. Doyle punted over the line. Doyle was forced to rouse and London had one more. Ottawa kicked off at the quarter, and Taylor returned, when Hobbs followed up. A series of scrummages followed, when Hobbs and Taylor pierced through the line for a touch. Taylor again failed to convert the try, and this finished the scoring for the day, for shortly after that the whistle sounded for time with the ball well at Ottawa's line. During the game the Ottawas had the best of the officials' decisions, but still they clamored against him.

New York, Oct. 20.—With the racing season in this country practically closed, the magnates of the American track are sending their best horses to England, where they will have plenty of time to get trained and acclimated before the racing season in that country commences. The first consignment—including some of the best horses on the local track—were shipped for London on the Atlantic transport, liner Minnehaha, today. Some of these horses are the property of Wm. C. Whitney, James R. Keene had a long string, among which were Cap and Belle and Noonday. WHEEL

Toronto, Oct. 20.—The great annual road riding contest of the year for the Dunlop trophy was run off this afternoon on the Kingston road. About 5,000 people witnessed the struggle from different points of vantage along the course, no fee being charged for viewing the race, as it was ridden all through on the road, from the top of Norway Hill to 7½ miles out on the Kingston road, and return. Four teams entered the race, the Royal Canadians of Toronto, the Queen Citys of Toronto, the Ramblers of Toronto, and a team from Belleville. The trophy put up by the trustees of the race is the third one offered by the Dunlop road race for road racing, the Royals having won the first two. The Pact

Between Great Britain and Germany

Viewed With Satisfaction at Washington.

Commended by the German Press—Bitter Comments of the Paris Echo.

London, Oct. 22.—The agreement between Great Britain and Germany to maintain the territorial integrity of China, while it savors of independent action and would doubtless be adhered to, despite the protest of any other power, is not looked upon here as forming an obstacle to the progress of negotiations on the basis laid down in the last French note, or, indeed, upon any propositions which will not infringe upon the essential principle of the Anglo-German compact.

There is no effort to conceal the fact that the new compact is practically a repetition of Secretary Hay's "open door" note to the powers, though it is pointed out that general assent to a principle differs greatly from the public expression of determination of two great powers to uphold it at all costs.

POSITION OF AUSTRIA AND ITALY.—Lord Salisbury should have selected Germany, of course, to be a party to this pronouncement, as it is taken to be highly significant of the close relation between the two powers in question, and may almost be said to constitute a tacit understanding for purposes of the immediate future, to be fair to bring Germany into even closer touch with Great Britain than she is with the other members of the triple alliance.

It is not, however, to be taken as a sign of the Anglo-German compact, as it is pointed out that Austria and Italy will readily accept an invitation to concur in the principles enunciated by the Salisbury-Hauschke agreement. That the United States will follow suit is taken here as a forgone conclusion, while the British foreign office expects Japan and hopes France will do the same. Russia, of course, is a difficult factor in the situation, but it is not believed she will stand out against the world, especially in the face of such a patently aggressive alliance as was announced this morning.

REASSURING SIGN.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—An inspired article in the Berliner Tageblatt regarding the Anglo-German agreement as a "reassuring sign for the peace of the world," and says that Great Britain, just as Germany does, expressly denounces all ideas of making use of the complications in China for her special advantages, and in economic aims adhere to the principle of equal rights for all. Germany, it is added, does not take upon herself the obligation of settling her influence where other powers have already acquired special rights. She regards the agreement as an important step towards the early establishment of a better condition in China. The tone of the article suggests that the agreement is welcomed as a protection against the exclusive claims of Great Britain in the Yangtze Valley.

With the exception of a few notoriously anti-British journals, the entire German press approves the Anglo-German agreement. Its effect on Russia is especially curious, it being so expected that the relations between Germany and Russia have already become cooler.

FEELING IN WASHINGTON.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The state department here has not yet been officially advised of the pact, but the news has been reported from London to have been reached between Germany and England to maintain the territorial integrity of China, and to keep peace open. The news is generally welcomed here, as this government has held this view right along, as shown by the note of Secretary Hay of July 8 defining the position of the United States. The German note, it is pointed out, adheres to the principles contained in this agreement, and if Russia can be brought to accept its terms as binding upon herself, there can be no doubt, according to official circles here, that a substantial movement will have been achieved toward a final settlement of the Chinese trouble.

A PARIS PAPER'S SNAIL.

Paris, Oct. 22.—The Echo, in an article on the Anglo-German agreement, points out the previously antagonistic positions of the two nations in China. The paper says: "Berlin denounced the monopolist schemes of England, and Londoners predicted an invasion of the Yangtze Valley by Germany. The two nations embrace and constitute themselves the champions of Chinese integrity. It is curious to see two knaves adopt this attitude."

WILLIAM'S LATEST.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—"I believe," said Emperor William recently, "that it is Germany's advantage for England to have the Boer republics." The remark was made in the course of a conversation between the emperor and one of the leading Germans, whose advice in matters of commercial policy his majesty greatly relies upon, and who, by the way, is not a lover of Great Britain and her works.

THE PAPERS WERE "OFF."

For several days the English and continental papers had contained hints, and even assertions, that Russia, France and Germany were contemplating joint action with the idea of coercing Great Britain into granting at least a degree of independence to the Boers. Several correspondents have adduced the most circumstantial details to prove the existence of this undercurrent of projected diplomacy between the powers mentioned, and this reiterated statement has even affected the markets. Whether Russia and France ever contemplated such action is not known, but the circumstances under which Emperor William spoke affectually and definitely disposed of all possibility of any European intervention, for it is acknowledged on all sides that the British content the Boer republic sprang, apparently, not from

any idea of gaining counter-concessions, or from a general policy of friendship, but from a distinct idea that Germany's commerce would be immensely benefited thereby, and that the adjacent German territory would be improved.

CAUGHT THE CROWD

Enthusiastic Reception Given John G. Woolley at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 22.—John G. Woolley, prohibition candidate for president, spoke to an audience of 3,000 persons at the Academy of Music here on Saturday. The reception accorded Candidate Woolley was probably the most enthusiastic which he has encountered since the special train left Chicago on Sept. 19. The entire audience rose to its feet when the presidential nominee was introduced at 9:45 o'clock, and it was over five minutes before the cheering subsided and he was permitted to begin his address. He made a 30-minute speech, which seemed to express the sentiments of his audience, giving much advice to the individual Christian voters. Samuel Dickie, of Addison, Mich., spoke for twenty minutes, criticising the friendly attitude of the present administration toward the liquor powers. The concluding address was supplied by Oliver W. Stewart, national chairman.

In the afternoon a side trip was made into New Jersey. At Millville Mr. Woolley drew a crowd of 2,000 persons in front of the W. C. T. U. temple.
