IRISH MOTOR RACE

A Dispute as to Who Shall Pay for
Policing Course.

London, June 28.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons, George Wyndham, chief secretary for Ireland, said he was willing the treasury should pay £1,000 for policing the automobile course during the races in Ireland next month, if the promoters of the race and the local county councils paid the remainder.

It is understood that the automobile club has refused to undertake any of the cost of policing the course. The sum of £1,000 has been collected for improving the roads, and an additional sum to pay for barricading the 170 cross-roads converging on the course. The club claims that this is sufficient for its part.

WAS TOO FEARLESS

A Kisheneff Doctor Forced to Resign
His Position.

St. Petersburg, June 28.—M. Doroshevsky, who was indefatigable in his attention to the victims of the Kisheneff massacre, and in his fearless publication of the truth concerning the massacre, has been forced to resign his position in the Bessarabian provincial hospital at Kisheneff.

The Southern Review declares the reason for this to be that "the published facts, figures and names which certain deputies wanted kept secret."

A magistrate at Kisheneff continues to hear and dispose of accusations of theft and destruction of property, respecting the more serious charges for higher tribunals.

According to Kisheneff correspondence the emigration movement shows no sign of abatement. Almost every household is sending members to the United States, while a few are going to Brazil, Argentina and South Africa.

THE IRON BOUNTIES

Unconfirmed Rumors That They Are
to Be Increased.

Ottawa, June 28.—The report current that the bounty on pig-iron ore increased from \$1.90 to \$2.70, and that the present bounties would not be scaled down until 1907, is probably due to the fact that an application to this effect was made by the iron and steel industry of the Dominion. The effect of the increase stated would be to place Newfoundland iron, which is used by the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, on the same footing as the native ore. The company in question had also been pressing for duties on steel rods and bars, for the manufacture of wire or steel plates over 30 and up to 50 inches, and skip steel that enters into the manufacture of pig-iron. These classes of material are at present exempt from duty.

Hon. W. S. Fielding's attention was drawn to the report, but he refused emphatically to make any statement in regard to it. A number of Nova Scotia members who were also present, expressed the belief that there would not only be an increase of the bounty, but that the duties on certain classes of iron and steel would also be raised.
